NO BONDS FOR YODER.
He is Proud that County Warrants Are Worth Face Value.

HUBBARD, Ore., R. F. D. Route No. 2, March 21.—(To the Editor of the Enterprise.)—I read your editorial in last week's Enterprise, "What Should Pay," and think it timely. I would like to ask Judge Webster who is at the bottom or, to use a slang expression, who expects to get in on the ground floor, if his bond amendment to the State Constitution becomes a law? I don't doubt that there are syndicates or moneyed men who would be glad to buy bonds bearing double the rate of interest paid by the banks. But how about the tax payers? If there is a farmer in this vicinity whose taxes were not about doubled in the last year I have yet to hear from him. I have heard this bond question agitated many years ago, and lived in a county that is burdened with a twenty-year debt, and when I think of the funds, strife, law suits, county judges imprisoned for refusing to levy taxes to pay the interest on those bonds, other judges shot from ambush because they did levy taxes, other judges going insane about the condition of county affairs, I must emphatically say: "No bonds in mine."

SENATE IS FAVORABLE
COMMERCE COMMITTEE TO REPORT ON PURCHASE OF THE OREGON CITY LOCKS.

STATE MUST PAY HALF
Government Will Buy Existing Canal and Locks or Acquire Land and Rights-of-Way For New Construction.

A dispatch from the Washington, D. C., news bureau of the Oregonian says: The Senate commerce committee has favorably considered an amendment to the rivers and harbors bill for the purchase of the existing canal and locks around the Willamette Falls, Oregon City, or a purchase of the necessary lands and the construction of a new canal and locks, in the discretion of the Secretary of War, to cost \$300,000, provided that no part of the appropriation be expended for the acquisition of the necessary lands and rights-of-way, and for such antecedent surveys and preliminary work as may be necessary in this connection until the state of Oregon shall appropriate a like amount.

He recently planted 250 choice fruit trees on this 150 acre tract. His farm is in charge of Andrew Zwan, who recently arrived from Minnesota. All of the Austrians who are to make their home in the Austrian colony are experienced in farming.
