FISHING SEASON IS
WIDE OPEN FRIDAY
BEGINNING TODAY DISCIPLES OF PISCATOR MAY RAMBLE IN THE STREAMS.

Fishermen who have not secured licenses from the County Clerk to fish in the state will be liable to arrest when fishing season opens, April 1. Following is a summary of the fishing laws of the state:
Beginning April 1 and continuing until November 1, trout may be taken with hook and line. Trout, salmon-trout and bass, however, may not be caught in any other way. It is unlawful to catch trout less than six inches long and not more than 75 may be caught in a day. In Klamath County, however, the limit is 25 trout in a day, or not more than 20 pounds. It is unlawful to fish at night, and unless trout are raised in captivity, their sale is prohibited. In Baker County trout-fishing does not open at the same time as in the rest of the state, the season being closed until July 1. In Lake River, Klamath County, the closed season extends to September 1. Fishing with hook and line in the Rogue River is permissible at all times.
The season is always open for salmon-trout and bass. The use of dynamite, gas or poison is forbidden by law.
Special laws have been framed governing salmon fishing. No salmon less than 12 inches long may be taken, and the spear, gaff and four hook may not be used. North of Willamette Falls at Oregon City no salmon fishing is allowed from March 15 to April 15 at noon. The season closes again June 15 and extends to November. South of the falls no salmon fishing is permitted at any time except with hook and line. It is also unlawful to fish within 600 feet of a fish-way or fish-ladder.
