### Over One Ton of Asparagus Shipped.

F. Hampton, who has two acres in asparagus, will reap about one ton this year. Several of the merchants of this city have carried this asparagus during the season, and find that there is a heavy demand for it. Mr. Hampton bought the plants when they were two years old, and finds that by careful attention a good profit can be made. He received the highest market price. Owing to the late season it is probable that the crop will last longer than of previous years, and that he will be able to supply the markets by the latter part of June.

### Fine Strawberries in Market.

Some of the finest berries that have ever been in the market have been brought in this week by many of the prominent growers of this city. Charles Roth states that he will have about 400 crates. R. S. Coe is receiving a good price for his, and on Wednesday took a load to Oregon City and found a market at once. One of the features of the afternoon, which promises to be a big drawing card, is the matched race between Zolock and R. Ambush, the latter of which is owned by Robert Britt being one of Zolock's colts. This will be for a purse of \$200 and \$200 added, winner to take all. This is to be one of the greatest matched

aces that was ever pulled off in the State of Oregon. The great pacer, Zolock's record is 2:05 1-4 and R. Ambush's 2:09 1-4. It is the fast California trotter that won the big trotter's stakes at Salem in 1907. No one should fail to see this race.

2:25 trot—Como, owned by Dr. Young, of Salem; Padishah, owned by Henry Tillman, of Portland; George Chamberlain, owned by Guy Young, of Salem; Dallas Boy, owned by E. Case, of Oregon City. All of these horses are new trotters, and much interest is being manifested by the owners.

2:20 pace—Florence Vaughan, owned by Stonewall Jackson Vaughan, of Canby; Blue Jacket, owned by Mr. Waite, of Portland; King Lovelace, owned by L. L. Thomas, of Stayton; Bonney Entrian, owned by Fred Brooker, of Portland; Lord Sidney Dillon, owned by Charles Ray, of St. Paul.

Entries are not all in for the running race and road race.

Bred Brooker, of Portland, has been engaged as starting judge. This has always been lacking at the races heretofore held on the race tracks of the best horsemen and starting judges on the coast. It is an assured fact that the races will come off successfully as scheduled. L. B. Lindsey, who has been on the race tracks for 54 years, and who is now the oldest man on the track at the present time, will drive several of the horses that will be in the races.

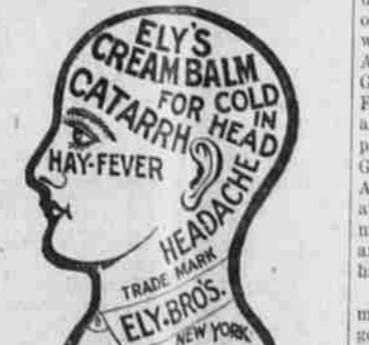
