Fair Executive Board Meets.

A meeting of the executive board of the Clackamas County Fair Association held a meeting at the fair grounds on Monday and transacted such important business. This board is composed of M. J. Lazelle, O. D. Eby, of Oregon City, and J. W. Smith, of Mackaburg. The upper floor of the big exhibit building will be reinforced. This will have to be done, as there are many more exhibits to be on this floor this year than last year.

A platform will be erected on the grounds between the pavilion and the grove, where the campers are stationed. Band concerts will be given each evening, and some of the best speakers in the state will be heard during the three days' session. The band concerts and speaking in the evening will be new features of the fair. Mr. Smith has been authorized to proceed at once for the necessary work, and everything will be in readiness at the opening of the fair on September 29.

On the main floor of the building will be an up-to-date refreshment parlor, which has been needed since the fair opened. This will be greatly ap-

preciated by the crowds that attend daily. Many are already in communication with the secretary, M. J. Lazelle, in regard to space for exhibits.

The baby show, which was such a drawing card last year, and when 50 babies were entered for the prizes, will also be another feature of this year's fair. This will be given on the platform on the grounds. There will be 14 different classes, and many handsome prizes are to be given away.

On the second floor will be the dairy display, which will be under the supervision of M. H. Shrock, of Hubbard, deputy food commissioner. Mr. Shrock will have in this display a model cow stall, samples of butter and cheese. There will be a dairy cow contest and prizes for the cow giving the largest quantity of milk and butter made from the cream. This contest will be on for two days. Many of the separator companies of Portland are to exhibit on this floor.

M. J. Lee will present a \$25 fruit basket for the best six boxes of apples.
