NEW SCHEME FOR RAILWAY

G. C. FIELDS SAYS HE HAS BACK-ING TO BUILD LINE TO MOLALLA.

MONEY IS BEHIND HIM

F. M. Swift, the Original Promoter, Does Not Have Faith in New Project, and Plans Gumboose Trip for Information.

G. C. Fields, of Portland, formerly traffic manager of the O. W. P. division of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Co., and a brother to E. T. Fields, local agent of the Southern Pacific Company, was in the city Wednesday, and announced his intention of promoting the construction of an electric railway system through the Molalla Valley. Mr. Fields declares he has the funds at his back to finance the enterprise, and that construction will start at an early date. He will at once attempt to secure his right-of-way and it is understood that one preliminary survey has already been made, and that the route will follow closely that of the Clackamas Southern Railway, better known as the Swift project.

Mr. F. M. Swift, who has been promoting the construction of an electric railway from Oregon City to Silverton through the Molalla Valley, for several years, was in town Wednesday. He had heard of the Fields' project, he said, and was inclined to make light of it. "I cannot conceive," he said, "how any promoter can obtain capital to finance a railroad without first making some kind of a showing. If Mr. Fields is in the deal, I think he is, and I ascertain the true situation in regard to this new scheme, I shall have something to say for publication."

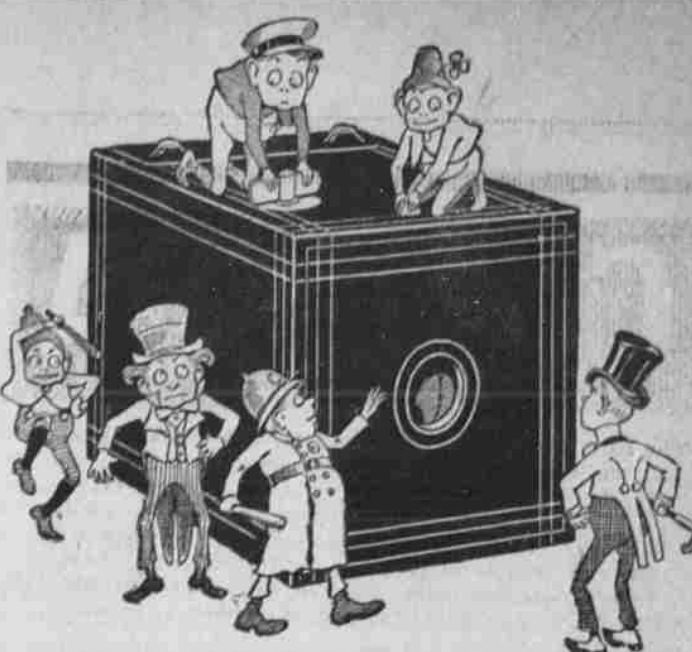
