The baseball game Sunday between the Canby Canals and the Montavilla Cubs resulted in the score of 5 to 0 in favor of the Cubs. There was a very good attendance, and the Cubs played an exceptionally good game. This is the first game of the season that the Canby boys have lost, and their defeat Sunday was largely due to many of the best players being off on their summer vacation. Eid Buys Interest in Store. John Eid, who has been conducting a real estate office in this city, has purchased an interest in the J. J. Sandness store, taking possession on Monday. Mr. Eid came to this city about a year ago from Minnesota. Alfalfa Can Be Raised in Canby. That alfalfa can be raised in this county without irrigation has been proved, as there is now in the office of the Canby Realty Company a sample of this hay which has been raised without irrigation on the Parmenter place, about one and one-half miles from this city. It is over three feet, and in this will be two crops. In this office are also fine specimens of gold, silver and copper taken from the Gold Creek mine. The mine is located in Marion county, close to the boundary line of Clackamas. There are 17 claims covering 340 acres covered with heavy timber, crusting approximately twenty million feet. The mine has opened up some 3,000 feet of tunnels. The ledges carrying the gold, silver and copper can be traced over a mile, and run from 10 to 60 feet wide on the outcrops, insuring for the future a huge permanent supply of ore. Mr. Combs, son of J. L. Combs, of this city, is connected with the mines. Several parties have already taken stock in the project. The Wilson-Gadsden Company, of Portland, has contracted to erect a large smelter at the foot of the ridge, in which these mines lie. This plant will cost \$100,000. Fine Specimen of Oats. A. M. Vinyard, one of the prominent farmers in the southern part of the county, has brought to the office of the Real Land Company a sample of oats that was raised this year on his farm near Canby. They stand six feet eight inches in height. The land on the Vinyard farm is well adapted to raising grain or vegetables and the owner takes an interest in his farm work to make the crops productive, which enables him to make a neat sum each season therefrom. The grain will be ready for threshing within a few days, and there is every prospect of a good yield. Committee Makes Report.
