RUNAWAY HAS A FATAL END

MRS. EVELYN KINDER IS DEAD AND OTHER INJURIES ARE SERIOUS.

INFANT IS BADLY HURT

Sunday Picnic Ends Disastrously for Family on Oswego Road When Frightened Horses Run Away.

Mrs. Evelyn N. Kinder, of 546 Marion avenue, Portland, is dead, the infant child of Mr. and Mrs. James W. Kinder, of the same address, is suffering from serious injuries which may yet prove fatal, and seven other persons were badly bruised and hurt, as the result of a wild runaway Sunday afternoon while a family picnic party were returning from a day's outing near Oswego Lake. About 3:20 o'clock, while coming down a steep grade on the Oswego road, the driver of the light spring wagon in which the party had ridden to the picnic, dropped one of the reins, and in attempting to regain it, fell between the horses. The team at once started to run and the wagon careened wildly down the road. When near the home of Mrs. Helen L. Corbett, Abernethy Heights, one rear wheel of the madly lurching vehicle dropped into a three-foot ditch and all the occupants were thrown violently from the wagon, some also pitching onto the wagon seats. Mrs. Evelyn N. Kinder, who died from her injuries, was unconscious, having suffered a fracture of the skull, and it was at once seen that the infant child of Mr. and Mrs. James Kinder had suffered serious internal injuries. The father and mother of the child were both badly bruised and cut. Miss Ida Kinder was bruised painfully about the body, and John R. Kinder suffered an injury to the hip and a slash across the face. Harry E. Kinder was seriously bruised, and both Thomas Maessie, of 372 Washington street, and his 6-year-old son were cut and bruised most painfully, the father's head being laid open.

James Kinder is a carman in the employ of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company; Thomas Maessie is a painter; John R. Kinder is a clerk, and Harry E. Kinder is a teamster.

The wagon and team belongs to H. W. Black, of the Sellwood Furniture Company, where John Kinder works. A keg of beer which had been taken to the picnic and emptied of most of its contents, bounced from the wagon just before the accident.

The body of Mrs. Kinder was interred in Mountain View cemetery at Oregon City, last Wednesday, Rev. Lewis, of Oak Grove, officiating.

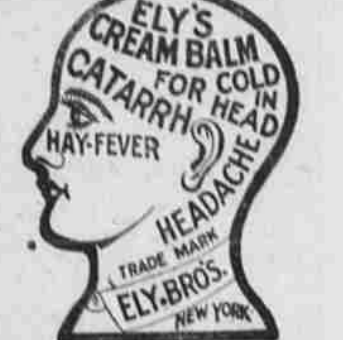
