

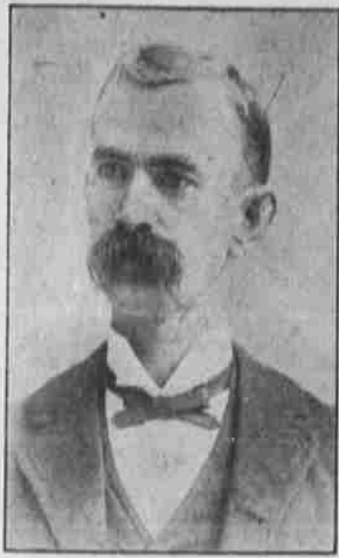

CLACKAMAS FIRES RAGE

FIERCE FLAMES IN TIMBER DESTROY MUCH PROPERTY OF GREAT VALUE.

GIBBS' MILL IS BURNED

Fire Leaps Across Clackamas River and is Coming to Point Between River and Mouth of Clear Creek.

Forest fires have reached Clackamas county and are raging in many sections. The flames are approaching Oregon City and the streets were covered with fine ashes yesterday morning. Considerable damage is reported in many places. Fire got into the Fred Wourms and Kroil's places Wednesday and destroyed 100 cords of wood belonging to Mr. Wourms, going down toward Beaver Creek and completely destroying George Gibbs' sawmill, a house and two barns, and is now headed southwest towards Canby. Another mill on the Beaver Creek and Highland road, about 10 miles south-east of Oregon City, was burned Wednesday afternoon.

The fires that have been burning around Estacada leaped across the Clackamas river Wednesday and is raging north of Viola, running down to a point between the mouth of Big Clear Creek and the Clackamas. The wind is driving the flames down the Clackamas river at a rapid rate and there is grave danger of additional loss to property. Fires are also reported in Clarks, close to Dix Bros sawmill, but are doing no serious damage, and the flames have got into a territory east of Clackamas Heights.

The flames have destroyed many telephone poles and the service is crippled in many places, making it difficult to obtain definite information.

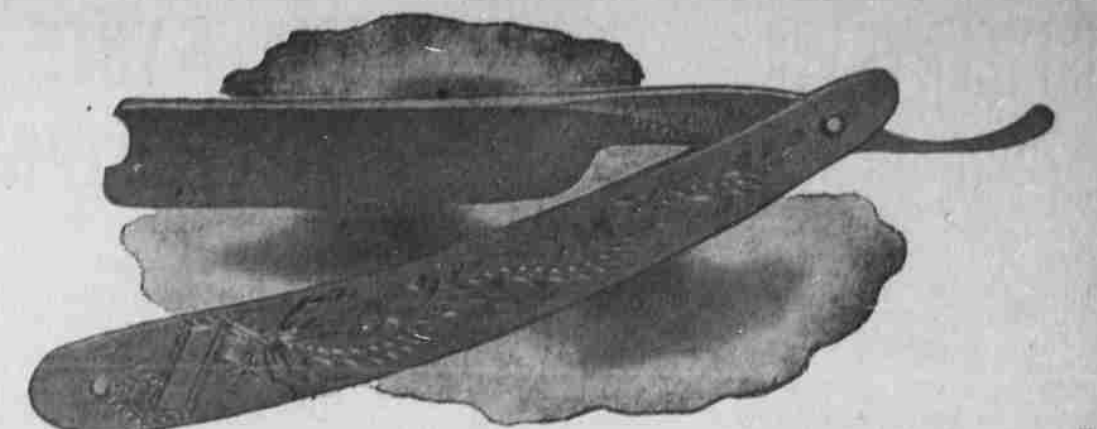
