SPLINTER CAUSE OF YOUNG MAN'S DEATH

Entered Scalp, It Formed an Abscess on the Brain, Ending Fatally. Carl Dawson, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Dawson, of this city, died at the family residence on John Adams Street between fifth and sixth street, Thursday night at 9:30 o'clock, after a brief illness. Several months ago the young man, who was employed by Mr. Bluhm on the latter's wood-sawing machine, met with a slight accident when a splinter entered his scalp. Nothing was thought of it at the time until an abscess formed at this breaking internally on the brain caused his death. Dawson was only confined to his bed one day before he expired.

This is the second death in the Dawson family within a few months. Thomas Dawson, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Dawson, was recently killed in a log jam of a sawmill at Wrights, Washington. Carl was with his brother at the time the accident happened and brought the body to this city. Both young men were well liked and popular, and their death is a sad blow to the family, as well as to their many friends.

Carl Dawson was born in Michigan and was about 20 years of age. He leaves besides his parents, Mr. and Mrs. James Dawson, five sisters and four brothers, who are Misses Edith, Bernice, Rhoda, Alice, Mable; Arthur, Kenneth, Howard and John.

The funeral services were conducted by Rev. P. Bowen, of Portland, Saturday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, from the family residence. The interment was in the family plot in Mountain View cemetery.

Several towns want Lebanon paper mills. The Mount Pleasant Civic Improvement Club met Tuesday night in the Mount Pleasant school house. This meeting was attended by the members. It was decided to repair the sidewalk leading from that place to Oregon City, as in some places it is in bad condition. A sidewalk was built about a year ago by the Club costing \$400, the part to be now repaired was not included in that built at that time.

The club decided to take the necessary funds from the club treasury. Vice-President J. M. Warnock is chairman of the sidewalk committee, and he will procure the necessary materials and men to help with the repair work. The club is planning to give an entertainment in the near future, and will be in the form of a harvest festival to be given at the school house. This is an annual affair given by the club, and which has always proved novel and entertaining affairs.

Three towns, especially, are said to be making efforts to land the plant, should the mills be removed from Lebanon, realizing the fact that as much banking as possible is done through local banks, where supplies as far as possible, are also purchased.

Lebanon business men, through the Lebanon Business League, are preparing to wage a hard fight, as they intend to retain the plant, which employs 150 men, and a decision regarding the necessity of a change in location will in all probabilities be thrashed out within the next 30 or 60 days. KILLED IN LOGGING CAMP. George Armstrong Meets Traigo End Near Rainier. George Armstrong, son of Mr. and Mrs. John W. Armstrong, of the west side, was killed on Wednesday afternoon near Rainier, while employed at a logging camp. The young man had been employed by the lumber company for only two weeks when he met his death. He was 21 years of age. The parents were notified of his death, and Mrs. Armstrong left for Rainier and will bring the body to this city. The funeral services will be held from the Catholic church.

BUSCH TO WRESTLE MEXICAN. German Grappler to Meet Dan Shotelo at Armory Wednesday. Carl Busch, who claims the title of middle-weight champion of Germany, has been matched against Dan Shotelo, a Mexican wrestler, in Oregon City Wednesday, October 19, at the Armory. Little is known about the Mexican hero, but he is said to be a husky man on the mat, and his manager, Leo Racker, says he will give Busch a hard tussle. The men will wrestle catch-as-catch-can, best two out of three falls, for a side bet of \$100.

TEACHERS INSTITUTE TO BE IN PORTLAND

CLACKAMAS AND MULTNOMAH PEDAGOGUES WILL MEET WITH OTHER COUNTIES. The annual Clackamas County Teachers' Institute will be held in Portland this year in connection with the Western Division of the Oregon State Teachers' Association. The counties of Clackamas, Washington, Columbia and Multnomah have joined forces and funds and the institute will be held Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, December 21, 22, and 23, in the Jefferson high school. Arrangements are being made by the executive committee to engage Eastern educational talent, which will be used the following week by the Washington State Teachers' Association, which holds its annual session during holiday week. During the institute the public schools of Clackamas County will be dismissed, closing Tuesday, December 20, and reopening Monday, January 2. All teachers of the public schools are required to attend the institute and will receive salary from their respective districts during that time.

INJUN PRISONER TO SERVE ANOTHER TERM

ALBERT FERRIS MUST PAY PENALTY FOR HIS DESPERATE DASH FOR LIBERTY. As a result of the action of the Multnomah County Grand Jury in returning a true bill against him, Albert Ferris, an Indian, who was sent to the penitentiary from this city may have to serve another term in prison.



The grand jury found two true bills, one against Ferris and one against Albert Murray, two convicts who effected an escape along with three others a year ago, while engaged as trustees cleaning up the yards at the State School for the Feeble-Minded, and who were later captured by a posse near the town of Buena Vista, 14 miles south of Salem.

The charge upon which Ferris and Murray are indicted is assault and robbery, committed by taking by force two revolvers and \$20 from the guards, Felix Davis and L. Hirtzel. Together with the three other trustees, two of whom were killed while in a pitched battle with a large posse, Ferris and Murray overpowered their two guards late in the afternoon while they were being escorted to their quarters after work, and taking possession of the guards' firearms, fled.

While Albert Murray has some time to serve, Ferris will have served his complete sentence at the end of this month, and upon stepping forth from the institution, officers will meet him and present a warrant of arrest for the crime with which he is charged by the Multnomah County grand jury. Ferris and his wife were sent to the penitentiary from this city two years ago for robbing the cabin of "Old Johanna," an aged squaw, who is well known to all of the early settlers.

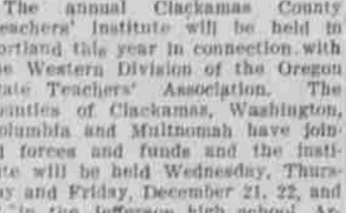

SCHOOL ENROLLMENT 750. Attendance Greater Than at This Time Last Year. There are 750 pupils enrolled in the Oregon City public schools, according to the report of City Superintendent F. J. S. Toole, made at the regular meeting of the board of directors. In the high school there are 110 students enrolled, at the Eastham building 281 in the grades and at the Barclay 352. This is a substantial increase over last year. Authority was given to install apparatus for domestic art in the gymnasium at the Barclay building. This is a new department. The board will proceed at once to obtain figures for its supply of fuel for the school year of 1911-1912.

SCHOOL OFFICERS TO MEET. Extensive Program Being Arranged by Supt. Gary. The Clackamas County School Officers' Convention will be held at the courthouse in Oregon City Saturday, October 22, and County School Superintendent Gary is preparing the program, which will include the following numbers: "The Course of Study for Rural Schools," H. G. Starkweather, Concord; "Some New Movements in Education," O. D. Eby, Oregon City; "The High School Fund and Its Application to Clackamas County," J. T. Apperson, Clarkplace. The meeting will open at 10 o'clock. The chairman of each school district in the county is a delegate and receives \$2 for attendance, and in case of his inability to go to the convention, he may appoint any other member of his school board or the district clerk.

SAWMILL BURNS DOWN. Moehne Plant at Willamette Completely Destroyed. Friday night between 12:30 and 1 the lumber mill belonging to Charles Moehne, about one mile above the Falls, on the bank of the Willamette river, was completely destroyed by fire, which started in the engine room. The amount of the loss is \$16,000. A large amount of finished lumber was destroyed. No insurance was carried. The origin of the blaze is a mystery.

SAMUEL ROAKE INJURED. Falling Plank Cuts Head and Leaves Him Unconscious. Samuel Roake, a well known forster, formerly of this city, but whose home is now at Clackamas, met with a painful accident on Wednesday of last week while loading a car of moss at Estacada. A plank on the car fell and struck him in the head, causing an incision in the skull. He was rendered unconscious and a physician was summoned. It was necessary to take several stitches in the wound. Mr. Roake is now confined to his home at Clackamas. His eye is injured, but there are hopes of saving the sight.

CHAUTAUQUA DIRECTORS MEET. Many Matters of Interest to Association Are Discussed. The board of directors of the Willamette Valley Chautauqua Assembly held a meeting Tuesday afternoon in the parlors of the Commercial Club and authorized the secretary to issue notices for the annual stockholders meeting, which will be held in Oregon City, November 15. The program for next season was discussed, and H. E. Cross and Secretary T. J. Gary will go to Portland today to confer with the representatives of other Pacific Coast Chautauquas relative to securing talent for the 1911 season. There will be representatives present from two of the leading Eastern lecture bureaus and it is probable that most of the talent for next year's Chautauqua will be selected today. This year's session netted a profit of close to \$900 and the showing is very gratifying.
