Milwaukee Has Ship Building Industry.

A new shipyard is being built in the northern part of Milwaukee by the Curtis Power Boat Company, of Portland, which will give from 35 to 40 men employment. This is one of the best ship-building companies in the state, having another plant at Portland.

The company has a payroll in Portland over \$1000 a month, and the building of the plant at this place will be a great benefit to Milwaukee. The building is located on ground that has been leased from J. H. Johnson, of Portland, and is a most desirable location for an industry of this kind. A large crew of men are at work on the building rushing the work to completion. The skids have already been put in place, and the mill will be in operation by the first of the month. A substantial building for the tools has been completed.

Horace Campbell will have a boat built at this plant which will be about 60 feet long, and this will ply between Milwaukee and Portland. It will be operated by gasoline, and will be the first boat built at Milwaukee, and it is probable that at the time of the launching of the craft that appropriate exercises will be held.

New Depot Nearing Completion. The new depot for the Willamette & Beaverton Railroad Company is nearing completion, and when completed will be a credit to the town of Milwaukee. The building, which is located on Washington & Irving streets, is built on the bungalow style with sloping roof. The exterior of the depot will be of cement and of a pebbled finish. The building is about 245 x 40 feet, and consists of two rooms, one for the accommodation of the passengers and the other for freight. It will be open to the public about the first of November, when one of the operators of the company will take charge.

The company since building its line through this section of the state is doing a good business and being well patronized. Two trips are made each day, one in the morning and one in the afternoon. The roadbed is considered to be first-class.

Many Pupils Enrolled. As the enrollment of the school has increased since the opening of the term the school board has found it necessary to employ another teacher. Miss Lou Albee, of this city, has been employed to teach the third grade. This property will be improved, a new cement walk constructed, and the parking will be planted to rose bushes.
