Harry W. Trembath, who left several weeks ago for Ketchikan, Alaska, in the interest of the United States Hatchery, returned Wednesday night, and reports a very rough trip on the return. Mr. Trembath brought with him 1,500,000 salmon eggs, which will be distributed in the hatcheries of Oregon. After reaching Ketchikan Mr. Trembath was obliged to go a long distance from that place to the hatchery. The lake over which he traveled in a launch was six miles long and three miles wide. He reports the hatcheries in that section in fine condition, and millions of eggs are shipped from there each year.
