During the past month men have come here in search of employment in the paper mills, which can be obtained, as the paper companies are desirous of obtaining the services of men with families, as this class of labor is more to be relied on that single men, who are apt to become transients. They have gone up against the proposition of failing to find houses for their families, and have therefore been compelled to go elsewhere in search of work. Not only is there a great scarcity of dwellings, but the hotels and boarding houses are crowded to the limit. It is stated that at this time 100 new houses that would rent for a reasonable amount would find desirable
