SANDY, OREGON. One of the most important events that happened in Sandy for a long time took place Monday evening when the tax payers of the town of Sandy met and agreed upon boundary lines for incorporating the town of Sandy with E. F. Bruns as chairman of the committee, who called the meeting to order, and the report of the committee read. After some discussion and a few minor changes the boundary lines as outlined by the committee were almost unanimously accepted and a permanent committee was elected as follows: C. Junker, E. F. Bruns, P. T. Sholley, to go ahead and incorporate the town of Sandy. Sandy Commercial Club held a very important meeting and many points of interest were acted upon.
