EARL BURK RUNS AWAY FROM HOME SIXTEEN-YEAR-OLD YOUTH HAS BEEN MISSING FOR THE PAST TWO WEEKS. NO REASON KNOWN FOR ABSENCE. Lad Had Asked Father to go to Portland With Him, and Soon After Dinner He Left—Whereabouts Unknown.

Earl Burk, a son of F. C. Burk, 515 Thirteenth street, has disappeared, and his parents are at a loss to account for his sudden disappearance. The lad left his home after dinner on Friday, November 11, and he was seen that night by Charles McCarver, and was also known to have been at the skating rink on Eleventh and Main streets. The boy is about 16 years of age, and is an unusually quiet and retiring young man. He was a student of the eighth grade at the Barclay school.
