# WILL PUSH DRILL

GAS AND OIL FOUND AT STONE BATTERED PIECE OF CASING HAS BEEN REMOVED-OBSTACLES NOW OUT OF THE WAY.

### DRILL TO BE SENT DOWN 1200 FEET SIGNS OF OIL MORE ABUNDANT DAILY

Will Not Start New Well But Sink Old One Down to 1200-foot Depth, Using Two

STONE, Or., March 6.-(Spl.) Well, the announcement is made officially that the oil well people have succeeded in getting the casing that was fast in the well loose and have drawn it out, thus solving that part of the difficulty confronting them. This casing had been fast in the well for several days and continued bat-tering at it had budly defaced the top and made it very difficult to get hold and draw it. This has finally been done, we are told, and the well is now in good shape for further progress downward.

That means that the first hole is to be drilled further into the bowels of Mother Earth, with the hope that there will be an oil or gas flow worthy

The Home Oil & Gas Company has succeeded in getting drillers that business thoroughly and these men will go ahead with the work. A night and day shift is to be operated from this on and it is be lieved that the well will be down the 1200 feet that the company has voted to go within the next 30 days,

This means that the company, nov that the well has been cleaned out, is satisfied with the present well and will not start a new hole but will push this one down deeper into the carth with the hope that it may prove productive. Prospects are very flatterare in no way discouraged as to progpects, but a trifle annoyed with the delays.


