DIRTY WORK IS DONE BY DYNAMITE DEVILS

TWO EXPLOSIONS SIMULTANEOUSLY INDICATE THAT PLOT WAS FIGURED TO MINUTE.

OMAHA, Neb., March 24.—Two charges of dynamite, placed in different parts of the new \$1,000,000 court house, exploded here this morning. The damage to the building was slight, though nearby structures were shaken by the explosion. Bloodhounds are being used in an effort to trace the dynamiters, who are known to have sought the injury of Caldwell & Drake of Columbus, Ind., who are the contractors on the building.

COLUMBUS, Ind., March 24.—The offices of Caldwell & Drake, contractors, were wrecked by dynamite here today simultaneously with the dynamiting of the Omaha court house. No arrests have yet been made.

HERE FROM CANBY. Assists in Unpacking Goods for the New Store on Main Street. BLIZZARD HITS EAST. Much Damage Done in Philadelphia By a Bad Cyclone. PHILADELPHIA, March 27.—(Spl.)—The section of country around this city was hit with a cyclone today and much damage done. Buildings were demolished, houses unroofed, and part of the railway system put out of commission. There was much loss of property and some loss of life. The northeast section of the city suffered the greater loss.

RUSSIA MAY ATTACK. VLADIVOSTOK, March 24.—(Spl.)—Rumors are afloat that the mobilization of troops has been ordered. The families of railroad employes on the Russian-Eastern line are departing from here. It is the belief that Russia will soon declare war on China.
