## FARMERS RALLY TO NEW RAILROAD

### CHARGE AGAINST ROAD FOREMAN DISMISSED

### BEAVER CREEK MEN ALSO SUBSCRIBE

Enthusiasm at Both Places Intense and Residents Are Eager to Assist Great Enterprise.

That the money necessary for the completion and operation of the Clackamas Southern Railway will soon be raised, was proved by the enthusiasm and desire to subscribe for stock of persons who attended two monster meetings Friday.

At a meeting held at Beaver Creek in the evening there was the same desire among those in attendance to be among the stockholders.

The fact that the promoters are giving their time and money, without any remuneration whatever, has attracted a great deal of attention and favorable comment.

Messrs. Grant B. Dimick, F. M. Swift, O. D. Eby and W. A. Shewman attended the meetings at Mulino and Beaver Creek.

Mr. Dimick explained to the men who assembled in the Grange Hall the work that had been done and the prospects of the road.

## EXAMINATION TO BE HELD FOR POSTMEN

### SUCCESSFUL CANDIDATES ARE TO GET POSITIONS AS VACANCIES OCCUR.

Postmaster Randall will, on next Saturday, conduct an examination for carrier-clerks. Five or six men have already made application to take the examination and it is expected that other applications will be filed.

There is no vacancy in the regular force of letter carriers at present, but there will soon be need for a substitute carrier. Mr. Butts, of Parkplace, recently resigned as substitute carrier.

The Oregon City postoffice is of the second-class, and carriers make from \$600 to \$1100 a year, according to the length of service.

Among the subjects included in the examination are arithmetic, spelling and geography.

## CHARGE AGAINST ROAD FOREMAN DISMISSED

### HARRINGTON PROVES THAT HE DID NOT ATTACK JUSTICE OF PEACE.

Edward Harrington, road foreman in the Oak Grove District, was acquitted Friday in Justice of the Peace Kelso's Court at Milwaukie, of a charge of having assaulted Justice of the Peace Bigham, of Oak Grove.

The altercation which resulted in a warrant being issued for Mr. Harrington occurred last Saturday. The foreman had just finished a road in Oak Grove when Justice of the Peace Bigham appeared on the scene and demanded that a ditch at the side of the road be filled.

Bigham is said to have threatened Harrington, whereupon the latter picked up a rock and prepared to defend himself.

Gladstone to Have Cars for Benefit of Growers in That Section—Rate Ten Cents Hundred.

The Oregon City Fruit & Produce Union, which is arranging to handle the strawberry crop of this vicinity, has obtained important concessions from the O. W. P. Railroad.

The railroad company has agreed to receive berries at the station until 9 o'clock in the evenings, which will be a great convenience to the shipper.

For the benefit of the growers below Gladstone, a car will be left on the spur at Gladstone each day in which the shipper can load at his convenience until 10 o'clock at night.

Clackamas county strawberries will should begin to ripen in a week or ten days. The prospect is for one of the largest yields in the history of the county.

## BEAVER BUILDING IS SOLD FOR \$50,000

### FRANK JAGGAR AND J. W. LODER ARE PURCHASERS OF PROPERTY.

The Beaver building, located on Main street between Sixth and Seventh streets, was sold Saturday by H. C. Stevens and William Anderson to Frank Jaggar and John W. Loder.

Mr. Jaggar formerly owned a half interest in the property, but about a year ago he sold his interest to Mr. Anderson, who with Mr. Stevens erected the two-story brick on Main Street known as the Beaver building.

The cost of the structure was about \$25,000. The property is considered to be among the most desirable in the city. The consideration was \$50,000.
