Also three cheers were given to the 15 little boys and girls who entertained the people with patriotic songs and recitations.

The Declaration of Independence was read by Miss Anglia Canning, who, as usual, in a most interesting way, read that sacred statement in such a pleasing manner to arouse the patriotism of the people to a high standard.

In the afternoon the numerous contests and races took place, the Carrisville band filling the air with sweet strains of music. With the cheering crowds Sandy closed the most successful celebration ever held.
