FRAUD IS BLAMED ON WICKERSHAM

HOUSE COMMITTEE TO PROBE STARTLING CHARGE OF ALAS-KAN DELEGATE.

Attorney General Alleged to Have Aided Men Who Robbed Government of Contracts For Coal Land.

WASHINGTON, July 14 .- After se cret consideration of charges made by Delegate Wickersham, of Alaska, that Attornew-General Wickersham deliberately permitted the statute of limitations to run against agents of the Alaska sydicate who defrauded the government, through perjury, to the extent of \$50,000, the House committee on judiciary has determined to report favorably a resolution of inquiry offered by Delegate Wickersham.

The resolution would call upon the Attorney-General to furnish the House with all documents, affidavits and testimony in his possession relating to an affidavit submitted to him more than a year ago and sworn to by H. J. Douglas, ex-auditor of the Alaska syndicate

Committee Is Startled.

Delegate Wickersham startled the committee when, in executive session, he produced a copy of an affidavit relating to an alleged criminal act, committed by Captain D. H. Jarvis, of the Alaskan syndicate, and formerly prominent in the Government revenue cutter service, who committed suicide in Seattle on June 2, the day following the introduction of the Wickersham resolution calling for production of the papers in the case, and by John H. Bullock, of the John J. Sesnon Coal Company, of Nome.

Through connivance of these men, it was charged, the Government was defrauded on coal contracts, and evidence to that effect was permitted to remain unacted upon by the Attorney-General's office for more than a year until the statute of limitations expired




