TAFT TO APPOINT NAGLE JUSTICE

PRESIDENT DECIDES AT LAST MOMENT NOT TO NAME HOOK.

NOMINATION IS EXPECTED TODAY

Marshall and Rosenwald Are Being Considered For Place in Cabinet To Be Made Vacant.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—The vacancy on the Supreme Court bench, the fifth that has occurred in the present administration, probably will be filled by the appointment of Secretary of Commerce and Labor Charles Nagel, of St. Louis.

President Taft is expected to send the nomination of Mr. Nagel to the Senate within a few days. United States Judge William C. Hook, of Kansas, who until last night was most prominently mentioned for the vacancy, is said to have been eliminated from further consideration at an hour's session of the Cabinet today.

All of the lawyers in the Cabinet, except Mr. Nagel, were present and afterward it was learned that the President had made clear his intention of appointing his Secretary of Commerce and Labor.

This report was so generally credited tonight that rumor was busy with a possible successor to Mr. Nagel in the Cabinet. Louis Marshall, of New York and Julius Rosenwald, of Chicago, were mentioned among those who would be considered by President Taft.

WOMAN SHUT FLAT TO FORMER PORTLAND MAN AFTER QUARREL.

DICKINSON'S FACE IS SCRATCHED

Letters Thought Written by Him To Mrs. Taylor Asking Her To Take Him Back Found.

NEW YORK, Feb. 5.—Investigation today into the mysterious murder of Mrs. Helen Taylor by the explosion of a bomb in her apartments last Saturday night brought out some alleged facts that the police regard as significant in connection with the recent movements of Charles M. Dickinson, formerly of Portland, Or., who was with the woman when the explosion occurred.

A few days before the explosion, Dickinson and Mrs. Taylor had a quarrel, the police say, in which the woman scratched Dickinson's face. Later Mrs. Taylor called on her sister, Mrs. Evans, and expressed fear of Dickinson.

A letter, signed by Dickinson, found among the dead woman's effects, the police say, begged that he "be taken back."

In Dickinson's pocket the police declare they found what was apparently the answer to his letter, which read: "If you know what is good for you, you will stay away from my flat."

On the day before the murder Dickinson passed many hours, the detectives learned, locked in his room and they are now investigating on the theory that the bomb was manufactured in his room.

With the scars of the scratches said to have been inflicted by Mrs. Taylor still showing on his face and looking haggard from the effects of his two days' incarceration, Dickinson was arraigned before the Coroner today, and there met his aged father, postmaster at Champlain, N. Y.

"I am innocent of this, father," he told the old gentleman.

"I believe you, my boy," he replied. The elder Dickinson obtained from the Coroner permission to have the hearing put over until Wednesday.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—Senator Rayner of Maryland, today introduced a bill authorizing the reappointment of Peter C. Hains, Jr., to the Army and restoring his old rank at Captain of Artillery. Hains resigned from the Army when he was a prisoner in Sing Sing for the murder of William E. Annis of New York.

SUBMARINE IN CRASH SINKS WITH 14 MEN

PORTSMOUTH, England, Feb. 2.—The British submarine "A-3" sank this morning, after a collision with the British gunboat Hazard off the eastern end of the Isle of Wight. Fourteen men sank, imprisoned in the submarine, and were drowned.

The Hazard threw out life buoys and launched boats, in case any of the men should escape, but none came to the surface.

The "A-3" carried a crew of 11 men, nine seamen and two officers, and three other Lieutenants were on board.

The submarine, which went out of the harbor this morning to carry out a series of diving and torpedo exercises, sank like a stone immediately after her collision with the Hazard and the flooding of the craft.

A big escape of gas which was observed on the surface immediately after she sank indicates that the vessel quickly filled with water. A cruiser stands by the spot where the disaster took place.

The submarine lies on the Princess Shoal, almost on the same spot where the submarine "A-1" was lost with all hands, on March 18, 1904.

The Commander-in-Chief of the Portsmouth division of the British Navy confirms the flooding of the "A-3" and the drowning of all the men on board.

British submarines belonging to the "A" class have been singularly unfortunate. The "A-5" had six men killed and 12 injured by an explosion at Queenstown on February 16, 1905. The "A-8" sank off Plymouth on June 8, 1905, when 14 men out of her crew of 18 lost their lives. The "A-4" sank during the maneuvers at Portsmouth on November 16 of the same year, but the whole of her crew were rescued with considerable difficulty. The "A-11" had seven of her crew badly injured by an explosion on August 6, 1910.

This class of boat is a single screw submersible of a modified Holland type, with a length of 190 feet and a beam of 12 feet eight inches. Their displacement is 180 tons. They are driven by gasoline motors when on the surface of the water and by electric motors when submerged. They have a surface speed of 12 knots and a submerged speed of eight knots. The motors develop 500 indicated horsepower on the surface and 150 horsepower when submerged. Their armament consists of two torpedo tubes.

MANY DYNAMITE BILLS RETURNED

MORE THAN THIRTY LABOR LEADERS SAID TO HAVE BEEN INDICTED.

ARRESTS OF MEN TO BE DELAYED

Only Officials With Offices in Indianapolis Thought To Be Involved—Amounts of Bonds Fixed.

INDIANAPOLIS, Feb. 6.—Union labor officials and agents, said to number between thirty and forty, whom the Government holds criminally responsible with the McNamara and Ortle E. McManis for perpetrating more than 100 explosions in cities from Massachusetts to California in the last six years, including the wrecking of the Los Angeles Times building, were indicted today. Thirty-two indictments were returned.

Capiases for arrests have been issued and all the men indicted are to be taken in custody on a day secretly fixed by the government, known to be within a week.

March 12 has been set for the arraignment before Federal Judge Anderson in Indianapolis.

The papers for the arrests designate the amount of bond which the defendants may give in the Federal districts in which they reside for their appearance here. The amounts of the bonds in the individual cases were not made known, but it was said in the aggregate they would total \$300,000.

Although the names of the defendants and their exact number were ordered withheld pending the arrests, it was said probably more than thirty-two, and possibly forty men are accused, inasmuch as more than one defendant was named in the indictments.

Asked if any men "higher up" had been indicted, United States District Attorney Miller refused to say. Intimation came from another source, however, that no officials other than those who had had headquarters in Indianapolis are involved.

TROOPS PROCLAIM GOMEZ PRESIDENT

MADERO IS BITTERLY ASSAILED BY REBEL GARRISON AT JUAREZ.

NAMING OF SUAREZ IS DENOUNCED

Chief Executive Condemned By Soldiers and Called Traitor to Country—Reforms in Taxation Asked.

EL PASO, Tex., Feb. 1.—Emilio Vasquez Gomez is proclaimed provisional president of the Mexican republic, and Francisco I. Madero is criticized in bitter terms in a proclamation secretly circulated today among the revolting Juarez garrison and members of the so-called new revolutionary junta in El Paso. The proclamation is dated: "Revolutionary camp in Chihuahua, February 1, 1912."

It bears the signatures of Louis Fernandez and Colonel L. Salazar, "chiefs of the forces of the north."

The proclamation is taken here as another indication of the possible connection between the revolt of the Juarez garrison and the Zapata movement in Southern Mexico. It is addressed to the "valiant sons of Chihuahua," and recites how they were among the first to ascend the Madero revolution of November 20, 1910, to "overthrow the tyranny which for more than thirty years joked with our rights."

"We did not get into the revolution," continues the proclamation, "that Don Francisco I. Madero might rise to the presidency to exploit the gratitude of a fanatic people, but to work out these great problems of government, namely, equal justice, equal payment of taxes, abolition of governmental favoritism, which supports an aristocracy at the expense of the masses, and an equitable distribution of property."

President Madero is criticized specially for "installing in office Vice-President Pino Suarez against the will of the whole republic." The proclamation pledges adherence to the plan of Tabucaya, and declares "the elections of the 1st and 15th of October null and void; the congress dissolved and its acts void, and the motive of its adherents to be the election to the presidency of Emilio Vasquez Gomez, who guarantees us, the country and all men that he will comply with the ideals of the last glorious revolution."
