SUNDAY SCHOOL UNION HAS FINE MEETING

The meeting of the Sunday School Graded Union was of more than usual interest. The Beginner's lesson was taught by Mrs. W. A. White illustrating with object lessons. Miss Purcell, the president, gave the Teacher Training lesson, the subject being "The Intermediate Age and Characteristics." Miss Purcell made a study of Teacher Training while at the Chicago Training school and is well qualified to instruct. The Teacher Training course is for the benefit of all grades as well as for elementary teachers. Mrs. J. W. Wilkins of Portland, was a visitor and gave many good suggestions, one being the use of symbols in illustrating the lessons. The Union will hold an institute soon and requests teachers in all Sunday schools whose pupils are doing hand work to bring samples for exhibition.

PORTLAND CLUB HAS OPTION ON BIG TRACT

Several wealthy Portland men have an option on thirty-seven acres owned by W. W. Raymond, of Walla Walla and seven and one-half acres owned by August Erickson on the Clackamas River about four miles from Oregon City, the intention being if the property is bought, to establish a country club. The tracks are large enough for a golf course of nine holes. The club will be similar to the Waverly course, and it is probable that several members of that organization will affiliate with the new one. It is planned to issue \$50,000 stock, \$35,000 to be preferred and \$15,000 common. Mr. Erickson conducts a tavern on the property which he has offered to sell to the prospective club.

DR. NORRIS SERIOUSLY ILL OF BRONCHITIS

Dr. J. W. Norris is seriously ill of bronchitis. He had been confined to his bed for two weeks and his friends are alarmed over his condition. Dr. Norris is one of the best known physicians in Oregon, and has been health officer of Oregon City and Clackamas County for several years. Mrs. Norris, one of the leaders of the Woman's Club, and who was largely responsible in having the McLoughlin home preserved, was operated upon several months ago for appendicitis.

EXPLOSION IN STOVE CAUSES HOME TO BURN

The home belonging to C. F. Baker near Carus was destroyed by fire last Saturday morning, with all of its contents except the wearing apparel belonging to Mrs. Baker. The family moved into the house about three weeks ago, and the loss is keenly felt by them.

HELD OVER ON CHARGE PREFERRED BY NIECE

Justice of the Peace Samson Friday held George Clyde, of Parkplace to answer to the grand jury, on complaint of criminal attack made by Mrs. Minnie Slater. Clyde denied the charge and his bail was fixed at \$500. The alleged attack is said to have been made February 12. Clyde, who is the complainant's uncle boarded at his niece's house.

BREACH OF PROMISE ACTION IS SETTLED

Settlement out of court has removed the breach of promise suit brought in the Federal Court by Mary E. Cronin against Walter B. Moore, son of ex-Governor Miles C. Moore, of Walla Walla, and backer of the Canby Canal Scheme. The young woman, who was a professional nurse, sued the son of Walla Walla's wealthy banker for \$100,000, charging that after he had promised several times to marry her he had changed his intention. She is forty-two years of age, and he but thirty-five, according to the documents filed. When the case was called in the Federal Court attorneys John F. Logan and John H. Stevenson asked for an indefinite continuance, stating that plans were under way for an adjustment out of court.

GIRL IS THROWN BY HORSE ON BARB WIRE

Miss Hoffmeister, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Hoffmeister, of Damascus, was injured Wednesday near the Hoffmeister home by being thrown against a barb wire fence from a horse she was riding. The horse became frightened at an automobile. Miss Hoffmeister, besides being badly shaken up, received several large cuts by coming in contact with the fence. Dr. Buy Mount of this city, was summoned.

HOME OF AGED MAN DESTROYED BY FIRE

A house owned by George Lazelle at Twilight, and occupied by William Zingley, who has been a county charge for the past twenty years, was destroyed by fire Thursday evening about 8 o'clock. The aged man had just returned from a walk and made a fire. The roof became ignited and soon the house was a mass of flames. Mr. Zingley called for help and succeeded in saving a few articles, but his bed, stove and other household goods were destroyed. He has now moved to quarters in Mountain View.
