



Flour bleachers are going to have very rough sledding from this time forth if the present activities of the trade would indicate any thing. California buyers are stirred up ov-

er the fact that Washington and Oregon millers are sending the artificially whitened flour into that territory, and there is strong agitation against a continuance of the practice.

According to an advice received from the south the trade there will practically boycott all northwest flour that does not show on the sacks that the product is not bleached. This, it is stated will be taken as a last resort. If the government prosecutes the offenders for violation of the pure food law the private interests will not take up the matter.

Flour millers who are not bleaching their product are joining the fight against the dopers. The only reason why flour is bleached is that it en-ables the miller to purchase low priced wheat and after bleaching make the product resemble the grinding of higher priced grain. This, according to those that are not trying to evade the laws, is unjust competition.
