The dissolution of the corporation is not sought but the court is asked to is-sue nine broad injunctions against lleged unlawful countracts, combinations, conspiracies and practices.

LONDON, May 22.-Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, the militant suffragette leader, and Mr. and Mrs. Patrick Lawrence, joint editors of "Votes for Women," were all found guilty at the Old Balley Sessions today, and each was sentenced to nine months' imprisonment on the charge of conspiracy and inciting to malicious damage property.

The jury in handing down its verd ict of guilty, acompanied it with a re-commendation that leniency be shown the prisoners, and Justice Coleridge, in determining judgment, took this into consideration.

The charge of conspiracy was brought as a sequel to the window-smashing demonstration in London. March 12. Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst was arrested for participating in the damage to property and was senter. ced on March 22 to two months' im prisonment, with a number of other
