At the rate wool is now moving in this state the indications are for a clean-up of the state's clip earlier than for many years past.

The latest events of interest were the sales at Shanko Tuesday and Wednesday when a total of approximately 1,600,000 pounds of the product was taken over by buyers at prices running from 13 1/2 to 15 1/2 cents a pound.
