WEATHER FAVORABLE FOR HOP GROWING

In the hopyards of the Valley generally the work of spraying now is actively under way, and with the weather favorable the eradication of vermin is progressing in a satisfactory way.

What the output of the state will amount to cannot yet be determined with anything like accuracy, but figuring on the present showing in the Valley yards dealers say that the yield in Oregon this year will in all probability run close to 110,000 bales in Washington it is estimated that the crop will amount to about 33,000 bales, and present estimates on the California product run from 85,000 to 90,000 bales.

Trade for the time is all but at a standstill, very little in the way of business being reported either in the old or new hops. In a more or less nominal way spot goods are quoted at 25 to 27 cents, but there is said to be little demand for old hops, and the scantiness of holdings in the state at this time contributes further to the quiet of the market.

For contracts on the coming crop the demand is similar slack. Occasional deals at 18 to 20 cents are reported, and one contract at the low figure of 17 cents is said to have been put through within the past week.

As going quotations on the new crop it is believed that if the demand were sufficient considerable contract business would be possible for the growers in many cases are said to be disposed to sell. The buyers, however, are quite generally inclined to hold back.

PRICE OF SUGAR ADVANCES 10 CENTS

The expected advance in the sugar market came Tuesday, the jobbers in Portland raising quotations on all grades of the refined product 10 cents a hundred, and it was intimated that a further lift in prices was liable to come at any time. The Eastern market now is 20 cents above the range quoted a week ago.

For two weeks or more there has been a generally strong feeling in the sugar market. On the Atlantic seaboard statistics compiled by the leading importers indicated that the output this year in some of the most important producing countries, notably Cuba, would fall considerably short of the predictions made a few months ago, and as the time passed and the movement of the commodity seemed to bear out these predictions the market steadily stiffened. That it will go well above the present level before the end of the season now is counted all but a certainty.

Another bullish factor of no small importance in the sugar market is the usual heavy increase in the demand during the summer months, when requirements for fruit canning and preserving operations reach their maximum. In the East the regular summer demand for sugar is reported to have set in with a rush, in the face of supplies available actually short of the showing at this time a year ago.

Reports from Cuba that the condition of the American market is felt in the Island in no uncertain way. Instead of selling freely the big producers there are said to be holding back, confident that the market from now on will show an upward tendency. From Europe come reports of steady, to firm beet sugar markets, which also tend to keep the American market in a firm position.

CATTLE MARKET IS STRONG AND STEADY

The Portland Union Stock Yard Company reports as follows: Receipts for the week have been, Cattle 1656; calves 977; hogs 2122; sheep 7090; and horses 2.

The cattle market has been strong and steady throughout the week. Good steers were not plentiful and buyers had to fill their requirements from medium grade offerings. Butch-

er stock was a feature of the cattle market. The hog market was characterized by an advance of 40 per cent on the week and by the arrival of the first shipment of eastern hogs since early in January. This is the period of the year between the closing of the winter feed and the appearance of stubble fed hogs, and in consequence the local market is quiet. There are quite a good many hogs in the country, however, and with plenty of grain for finishing purposes an adequate number of hogs for the markets needs is looked for from local territory.

Large offerings of sheep caused a break in the market, 15 cents to 20 cents. The first Mount Adams lambs arrived Friday and although they sold at a good price, killers had largely taken care of their needs in the early part of the week from a more inferior quality.
