First Thermometer.

The first thermometer was made in 1621 by a Dutch physicist named Cornellus Van Drebbell and consisted of a tube filled with sir, closed at its up per end and dipping at its other extremity, which was open. in a bottle of nitric acid diluted with water. As the emperature rose or fell the air in the tube increased or grew less to volume and consequently the figuid descended or rose. This instrument is now known as an air thermometer, but as its measurements were based on no fixed principle it was of little use.
