PURE WATER FOR VALLEY PROMISED

STATE BOARD OF HEALTH PLANS SUPPLYING CITIES FROM CLEAR LAKE COST WOULD BE ABOUT \$4,000,000

Cooperation Financial and Otherwise Will be Asked of Places to be Benefitted—State Back of Scheme

SALEM, Or., Dec. 21.—Laying the foundation for one of the greatest pure water supply plans ever attempted on the Pacific coast, the State Board of Health at its annual meeting here today adopted a report from Engineer Kelsey, which covers a pure water plan from Clear Lake to provide water for all of the cities and towns of the Willamette Valley. Some such a project was outlined by the State Board of Health months ago and it was placed in the hands of Mr. Kelsey to work out the details. The report has been finished and 1000 copies of it will be printed. Clear Lake, 106 miles from Salem, on a line, the source of the Willamette River and a lake with an inexhaustible supply of pure mountain water, was selected as the source of supply for the immense system that is contemplated. The scheme, in a nutshell, is to place the state behind the project. The cost of realizing the dream of the members of the State Board of Health is estimated at approximately \$4,000,000. Cooperation, both financially and otherwise, would be demanded of all the cities and towns that come under the project, including all of them in the Willamette Valley down to Portland. Part of the scheme would be the furnishing of a source of supply to the State Capitol and all of the state institutions.
