TENTH OF HOP CROP IS CONTRACTED FOR

According to figures given by various dealers, about a tenth of the probable hop crop during the coming season has already been contracted to date.

Recently there has been considerable business passing in the contract market at 15c a pound, but the growers are showing more disposition to let go at this figure.

The eagerness of brewers to purchase 1913 contracts at 15c a pound is indicated by their small surplus. It is stated that in no time during recent years have stocks of hops in the hands of brewers throughout the world been so limited as at the present time.

Market for spot hops continues very firm. There has been a gradual hardening tendency in the price of the poorer grades, and the range of prices is from 17 to 20c a pound. Business has recently been reported at both figures.

Spot hops are being held firmer than contracts by growers. There is a fair amount of business available at the price now quoted, and the movement is held back only by the lack of general offering by the country.

SPUD DEMAND IS SOMEWHAT BETTER

There is a slightly better demand for potatoes, but no improvement is showing in the price. There are fewer arrivals, owing to the bad conditions of the roads, making it almost impossible for many growers to market their stock at this time.

There is no shortage in offerings, but the demand is better because nearby growers are no longer supplying the bulk of the retail trade direct.

A small movement in the potato trade is still showing with California, but the call is not pronounced enough to force any change in the price. In fact, as soon as the roads are good enough for growers to offer their stock generally, the market will again be overfed. This is the reason why buyers are not forced to offer above the former price. Growers are very glad to let go, and the only thing that kept the movement down previously was the lack of demand even at prevailing low prices.

LIVE STOCK PRICES SHOWING ADVANCE

The Portland Union Stock Yards Company reports as follows: Receipts for the week have been cattle 1177, calves 81, hogs 3182, sheep 4290, horses 47.

The eight-cent beef market predicted some time ago by the trade, has arrived, along with a general advance throughout the cattle market. Cows and heifers are steady to a quarter higher than the price range a week ago. Prime top cows are \$6.75 to \$7.00 and heifers \$7.25 to \$7.50.

The veal market continued strong at \$9.00 for choice light calves. Heavy stuff brought \$7.75. Bulls and stags are firm to higher. All top sales in the cattle market this week surpass any previous record on the Pacific Coast.

The hog market stiffened unexpectedly, as receipts decreased fifty per cent compared with a week ago. The top selling bid for the six days was \$7.70 but the bulk of the sales averaged not over \$7.50. Price basis is not very firm and too liberal liquidation may have a tendency to undermine existing quotations.

Sheep house business was conducted on a fall scale when opportunity offered. Packers are experiencing a mutton and lamb famine and are raising bids to get prime stock. Best yearlings withers sold frequently at \$3.00, ewes were not offering, lambs realized record prices Thursday when two cars passed over the scales \$7.35. Bulk quotations range from \$6.75 to \$7.25 according to the quality. Demand for prime fed stock is urgent. The following are sales representative:

SWEET CLOVER

Mrs. Minnie Hall, of Calif., California, writes as follows: "Is sweet clover as good for pasturing cows as alfalfa? How many pounds are usually sown per acre?"

There are many farmers who have good sweet clover pastures, and seem to be getting fair results from this crop for that purpose, but as a general thing, it is considered a noxious weed. Stock will eat sweet clover when they have become accustomed to it, but due to a slight bitterness, it is not usually relished as much as other clovers. We have known of instances where, after the stock had become accustomed to sweet clover, they seemed to eat it readily and do very well on it. In comparison with alfalfa as a feed for live stock, alfalfa is far superior. Alfalfa must be pastured very carefully, because the cattle are apt to bloat from eating it, especially in the fall of the year or early spring.

A much more satisfactory method is to cut the alfalfa and feed it as a soiling crop, or to cure it and feed it as hay. Experience shows that one will get a great deal more feed off an acre if handled this way than if the stock are allowed to graze the alfalfa.

Thus he finds that the grain would develop in the following way: In the second year, 2,500 grains; in the third year, 125,000 grains; in the sixth year, 15,625,000,000 grains; in the twelfth year, 244,140,625,000,000 grains. The third year's crop would give 300 men one meal, leaving enough bran to feed eight pigs for one day. The produce of a single grain in the twelfth year would suffice to supply all the world with food during their lifetime.
