

IMPROVEMENT SHOWN IN HOP MARKET

Liberal contracting movement is shown in the hop trade at Willamette Valley points. Fifteen cents a pound is being freely offered for contracts on the coming Oregon crop.

At the present time there is practically nothing pressing in the spot hop trade. This is expected and the belief of the trade is that little business will be done until around the middle of the month, similar to that shown last month.

Buyers' holdings at this time are nominal, therefore, if there is any movement in spots in the immediate future, they may be secured from the producers.

Conditions in the hop market throughout the world are rather quiet at this time owing to the smallness of holdings and the tight prices that buyers are asking.

DEMAND FOR APPLES SHOWS IMPROVEMENT

There is a very liberal movement of apples in the local market, and stocks in the country while still liberal are showing a better cleanup than had been anticipated.

The apple eating movement inaugurated by customers is having a good effect on the trade, and while there has been no change in prices, trade is much more satisfactory.

The public is buying apples, and is buying them cheap. The best Ben Davis are offered around 60 to 65c a box, and some ordinary stock of that variety for less.

BUTTER FAMINE SEEMS IMMINENT

The scarcity of fresh creamery butter is the most pronounced known to date this season. Not only are city creameries reporting a shortage in the make, but outside makers say they are not receiving sufficient cream for their own requirements.

This condition is true of practically every section of the Pacific Northwest at this time, therefore none of the districts are able to help out the others.

The butter trade must, therefore, worry along with about half of its requirements. While the present strength of the market would speak for a further advance in the price, creamery interests, as a rule, are not inclined to look with favor upon any change in quotations.

CATTLE TRADE IS SLIGHTLY IMPROVED

SUFFRAGETTES IN CHARGE OF CAPITAL

PROMINENT WOMEN MARCH IN GREATEST PARADE FOR EQUAL RIGHTS

FAITH, HOPE AND CHARITY TABLEAU

Pageant Forms at Peace Monument and Fair Marchers Proceed Along Pennsylvania Avenue

WASHINGTON, March 3.—The suffrage parade took shape simultaneously in two different portions of Washington this afternoon.

The pageant proper—presented by a tableau of over 100 classically garbed women typifying Faith, Hope, Charity, Justice, Liberty, Columbia, Government and kindred subjects—was staged on the broad terrace of the treasury building.

Several pretty young suffragettes appearing in nebulous garb to form tableaux braved pneumonia because of the biting cold.

Mildred Anderson, impersonating "Hope," and Florence Noyes, impersonating "Liberty," appeared barefooted. Some of the characters wore gauzy garments, but declared they also were woolen under-wear.

The weather was clear, and the grandstand filled early. The dignitaries were made by 75 Illinois women, who wore white broadcloth suits trimmed with gold.

Pretty girl "newbies" with gaudy dresses over their shoulders sold suffrage literature on the streets. Other suffragettes sold doughnuts, pies and sandwiches along the line of march.

Among the women partaking in this portion of the suffrage celebration were Hedwig Rieche, the New York actress; Flora Wilson, daughter of the secretary of agriculture; Mary Shaw, the Shakespearean actress; Flora La Follette, daughter of Senator La Follette, and many other noted public performers, all of whom held symbolic poses during their review of the mile-long procession.

The parade formed about the peace monument which stands at the foot of the capitol terrace at the lower end of Pennsylvania Avenue. It was headed by the grand marshal, Mrs. Richard Coke Burleson. She was clothed in semi-military attire and sat her horse like a field marshal of Napoleon's old guard.

Next came Miss Inez Milholland, also mounted. She was the herald for the parade, and was dressed in robes of yellow, surmounted by a great purple banner whose staff fitted into a stirrup cup and rose above her head.

Following came 100 ushers, robed in light blue and gold and carrying yellow and blue pennants. Young girls, mostly of Washington, appeared in this group. They marched on foot, preparing the way for the officers of the National American Woman Suffrage Association.

Leading these officers as they strode along was their president, the Rev. Anna Howard Shaw. A pace or two behind Miss Shaw were Miss A. Anita Whitney of California, second vice president of the National Association, and Mrs. Mary Ware Dennett of New York, corresponding secretary.

Behind these came Mrs. Susan Walker Fitzgerald of Boston, recording secretary; Mrs. Katherine Dexter McCormick of London, treasurer; Mrs. Harriet Burton Ladd of New York City, first auditor, and Mrs. J. T. Bowen of Chicago, second auditor of the association.

The Second Regiment band followed, playing a martial air. Then came 40 ushers—more young girls—attired in light blue and gold, as were the 10 who went before. They acted as the body guard for the leaders of the cause and were followed by a mounted brigade composed of Washington women garbed in long capes of gold-ent tan.
