COUNTRY MILLERS SHADE MILLSTUFFS

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MILWAUKIE PLANS WATER SYSTEM

COUNCIL APPROPRIATES \$20,000 FOR PROVIDING BETTER SUPPLY

BONDS TO BE OFFERED AT ONCE

People Vote for Organization and Maintenance of Fire Department—Streets are Opened

Milwaukie injected progress into its city government in great quantities Tuesday in the city election. New water bonds of \$20,000 were voted, along with the necessary permission to condemn property for new streets and a proposition to divide the city into wards and precincts for election classification purposes.

The new water bonds were voted for the purpose of buying the present water system. Eventually it is intended to secure Bull Run water, which will cost about \$40,000 more.

It is also planned to lay paving for six blocks on Front Street and 10 blocks on Monroe Street. These improvements will cost \$35,000.

The creation and maintenance of a volunteer fire department was also provided for at the election, and the city council was given permission to open new streets. One of the propositions passed provides for the exercise of the referendum in regard to city officers and questions. Biennial elections were also provided.

Miss Florence Olson, who served Tuesday, was the first woman to ever act upon a Milwaukie election board. Fifty of Tuesday's voters were women.

Milwaukie presents the action of Governor West in stationing Tom Kay to watch the roadhouse, as the city already had employed C. J. Reed for the purpose, and the present administration is enforcing the laws.

CATTLE MARKET HAS FIRMER TONE

The Portland Union Stock Yards Company reports as follows: Receipts for last week have been: cattle 809, calves 19, hogs 2706, sheep 2542, horses 44.

A somewhat firmer cattle market last week. Transactions were limited due to the light liquidation. Prime heavy steers went to the killers \$7.75 to \$7.85. Bulk \$7.50 to \$7.60. Butcher stock was also stronger but a true line on market stability is difficult to obtain so long as receipts are small.

The hog market continued its ascent last week and reached the high point Wednesday when several hundred head of choice light swine realized \$9.25. Bulk of sales averaged \$9 to \$9.15 while smooth and rough heavy stuff brought proportionally stiff prices.

Mutton trade was a sticky affair compared with recent periods. Fleets of sheep are arriving but the bulk is contracted. Buyers are bidding steady prices for good weathers and ewes. Best load of weathers sold at \$5.85 and ewes \$4.50. Lamb market is steady to firm at unchanged prices. Choice shorn lambs brought \$6.24 Thursday.

COLD WEATHER PUTS CHICKEN PRICE UP

The cold weather of the past few days has had the effect of causing the price of chickens to rise slightly in the local market. They have this far only advanced about one cent in price. Mohair has entered in the Oregon City market and is selling at 32 cents. Wool is selling from 14 to 20 cents.

the present time. Latter returns are being made by Front street that are received by those that ship direct to retailers.

This is due to the fact that the latter are in no position to handle all the supplies when the market is well filled, therefore they are compelled to shade value below the wholesale market in order to unload them to some other dealer. This being the case they are unable to make as good returns as Front street whips has a wider market.

Egg prices ruled on Front street from 13 to 13 1/2 for case count Saturday but the higher price was seldom realized. Some were selling as high as 14 1/2, but most interest was asking 13c. A further advance is showing in the price of eggs at other centers along the coast, indicating that the local improvement is reflected elsewhere.

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
