> Salmon Mousse.-A good cold dish is known as mousse of salmon. Remove skin and tones from half a pound of raw salmon, put it into a buttered bak ing dish, sprinkle with sait and pepper and pour over it a winegiassful of white wife. Cover closely with a piece of buttered paper and let it cook twenty infinites in a moderate oven. When cold put the fish through a wire sieve and stir into it one and one-half cupfuls of traif set aspic Jelly which has been thoroughly beaten into one cupful of whipped cream. Add one teaspoonful of anchovy essence, a few drops of lemon juice and enough vegetable coloring (red) to make the mixture a clear, pale pink and till a china mold with it.
