Cookery Points

Luncheon Dainties.

Sponge Pudding.—Take five pieces of plain sponge cake, split them and spread with butter. Put them together again and lay in the bottom of a buttered pudding dish. Make a custard of three eggs, three cupfuls of milk and half a cupful of sugar. Flavor with a teaspoonful of vanilla, pour over your cake and bake half an hour. The cake will swell and fill the custard.

Cream of Rice.—To three plates of new milk add a stick of cinnamon, two tablespoonfuls of rice and three tablespoonfuls of sugar. Bake down slowly until it is reduced to one part. Serve cold.

Buttered Eggs.—Put a tablespoonful of butter in your omelet pan and when melted break in carefully as many eggs as you require without crowding them. As soon as they begin to set pour over them enough hot water to just cover and let them finish cooking without boiling. Season with salt and pepper and carefully place each egg on a round of well buttered, softened toast.

Graham Cake.—Take a cupful each of raisins, sugar and sour cream. Stew the raisins until tender. Add four and a half cupfuls of all purpose flour, a pinch of salt and enough graham flour to make rather stiff. The addition of two eggs will improve the cake, which is an excellent one.

Chicken Cream.—Chicken cream is delicious, and it's not the same as creamed chicken by any means. The directions are that you should pound one-half cupful of cooked chicken till quite smooth with one and a half tablespoonfuls of thick cream sauce, a little red pepper and two tablespoonfuls of butter. Add one cupful of stiff cream, put through a sieve, pour into a dish and put it in a cool place. Found one-half cupful of lean ham or tongue with one and a half tablespoonfuls of tomato sauce, a wineglassful of sherry and a very little red pepper. Mix in one cupful of aspic, put through a sieve and put away to set. Line some molds with aspic, place in each a round of the chicken puree cut to fit the mold, set this with a little aspic, then a layer of ham puree, and fill the dish with alternate layers and put aside again until set. Turn out on a platter and arrange about a macedoine of cold cooked vegetables with mayonnaise in the center.

Pittsburgh Potatoes (Fannie Farmer).—Wash and pare potatoes, cut in one-half inch slices and slice in one half inch cubes. There should be one quart. Add one small onion, finely chopped, and cook in boiling salted water to cover seven minutes. Add one-half cup of pimentos, cut into strips, and boil five minutes, then drain. Put in a buttered baking dish, pour over two cups of white sauce, to which has been added one-half pound of grated cheese, and bake until potatoes are soft.

Salmon Mousse.—A good cold dish known as mousse of salmon. Remove skin and bones from half a pound of raw salmon, put it into a buttered baking dish, sprinkle with salt and pepper and pour over it a wineglassful of white wine. Cover closely with a piece of buttered paper and let it cook twenty minutes in a moderate oven. When cold put the fish through a wire sieve and stir into it one and one-half cupfuls of stiff cream. This mixture has been thoroughly beaten into one cupful of whipped cream. Add one teaspoonful of anchovy essence, a few drops of lemon juice and enough vegetable coloring (red) to make the mixture a clear, pale pink and fill a china mold with it. Smooth the surface, sprinkle with chopped truffles or parsley and set it away on the ice for two hours before serving.

Rice Custard.—Rice custard is not a bit like the ordinary rice pudding. To make it you must first beat thoroughly together two eggs, one-half cupful of sugar and one heaping teaspoonful of butter. Next put one cupful of cold boiled rice through a meat grinder, using the finest cutter, or through a sieve. Mix this well with the egg, sugar and butter, add two cupfuls of hot milk and stir thoroughly. Add vanilla or nutmeg for flavoring and bake in a pan of water until brown.

Peanut Sandwiches.—There are several ways for using peanuts for sandwich. They may be simply pounded and stuffed into well sprinkled with salt and seasoned with a few drops of Worcestershire and spread thickly between slices of buttered bread, or they may be powdered and stirred in mayonnaise for the filling, mixed with cream cheese and spread between crackers or slices of stiff buttered bread. An other way: With a mince cutter cut slices of bread round, cover with whipped cream and sweetened; moisten some peanuts fine and sprinkle thickly over the cream. Slice for afternoon luncheon.

Baked Squash.—Cut open the squash, take out the seeds and, without paring it, cut it into large pieces. Put these in a baking pan and set in a moderate oven, and bake about an hour. When done serve the pieces hot on a dish, season with butter, salt and pepper. Some like a little cinnamon or nutmeg. Squash has a finer flavor and is sweeter baked.

Woman's World

Details of Greatest National Suffrage Parade.

Never in the comparatively short history of the suffragist movement in this country were such elaborate plans made as for the inaugural suffragist parade at Washington March 3. Winning their way against constant opposition by the force of public opinion, smiles and reasoning rather than wrecking windows and destroying public property, the women of the cause gained practically everything they asked for. There was a slight trouble in getting the use of Pennsylvania avenue for the procession and the use of grand stands and the staging of the tableaux on the south steps of the treasury building, which is within a block of the White House.

Through the efforts of Mrs. Glenna S. Tinnin and Miss Hazel MacKaye the wonderfully beautiful tableaux originated. Mme. Nordica as Columbia, dressed in classic costume, singing "The Star Spangled Banner" and surrounded by the five virtues with which every woman is endowed—Liberty, Justice, Peace, Hope and Mercy—could not fail to be an inspiring sight. The arrangements called for the virtues to be impersonated by Florence Fleming Noyes, the famous classical dancer, as Liberty; Miss Flora Wilson, daughter of the secretary of agriculture, as Justice; and other equally well known women as the other virtues.

An account of the procession, parent and mass meeting was naturally conceived by the suffragists to impress upon congress and inaugural visitors from all parts of the country the strength of the movement in the United States and other countries and to actively begin a campaign for an amendment to the federal constitution letting down the bars against women voting all over the country. This campaign will be actively carried on in the future.

Women in 1400 B. C.

In its treatment of women the Egypt of 1400 B. C. was far ahead of its neighbors. There women suffered under none of the rigorous laws or customs that made life a burden to the east. The Egyptian woman of the lower and middle classes was more independent than any other woman in the world. She went about the streets unwatched and talked with whom she pleased. Her husband had no right to control her actions so long as she remained a faithful wife and kept the house in order. Within the home the Egyptian wife had supreme authority. One writer even speaks of the husband's position as that of a mere privileged guest.
