STRAWBERRIES NOW AT 5 CENTS A BOX

Strawberries reached five cents a box Monday, both in Portland and Oregon City, as well as in other markets. The fruit is in the best shape, the price being brought down by heavy supply and fear that rains, which are threatening, will spoil the fruit now ripe. Growers are selling generally at \$1 a crate of 24 boxes, which does not leave a heavy profit for those handling the berries. Some high-grade berries are bringing \$1.25, but it is not believed that this price will maintain for long. Eggs are again off in price, running from 17 to 18 1/2 cents a dozen in wholesale markets. Poultrymen who sell direct to consumers are getting 20 cents, which is also the prevailing price in stores. Asparagus continues in good demand, and is bringing from 65 cents to a dollar per dozen bunches. String beans are ranging from 10 to 12 1/2 cents a pound. Much of the supply is sunburnt. Lettuce is plentiful but not over-good in quality. Other market goods are about the same as last week, cloudy weather having had an influence on steady prices that were threatening to break.

BERRY QUOTATIONS HOVER ABOUT \$1.25

Strawberries seem to have found their own for awhile, and are settling down to sales in the neighborhood of \$1.25 a crate. Prices are varying from this, and "straws" are selling at retail from three to four boxes for a quart. Washington berries are finding their way in quality, but late arrivals of Oregon berries are showing such great improvement that there will soon be but little choice between the two. Eggs still continue to be quoted in Portland markets at from 18 1/2 to 20 cents a dozen. Retail prices are ranging from 20 cents up, and poultrymen are selling at about the same figure direct to consumers. Cherries are selling from 10 to 12 1/2 cents a pound. The fruit is much better than that seen earlier in the week and has more flavor. New potatoes are falling back in price somewhat, arrivals from the south glutting the local market. Green vegetables are remaining about the same, though peas and lettuce are inclined to be higher, owing to the continued hot weather. Other vegetables are steady and plentiful.

SUMMER WEATHER WEAKENS MARKET

Berry offerings are improving in quality, though prices are about the same. Farmers are selling their fruit from a dollar a crate up, depending upon grade. Sunburnt fruit is being replaced by better berries, as those that have ripened later are being brought out and buyers are finding offerings much more attractive. Picking is general throughout the state and in Washington. Northern berries seem to be the best so far, probably due to the fact that the early heat was not so extreme. Eggs are still hovering between 18 1/2 and 20 cents on the wholesale markets, and poultrymen are selling direct for from 20 to 22 cents. The market is weak, and further variations in prices are expected. Butter is increasing slightly in price, but not sufficient to cause much comment. Outside demands for cream is said to be the cause for the rise. New potatoes are gaining strength on the market, and are being generally bought, the demand helping to raise prices. Old spuds are being generally discarded, and ranchers and growers are not even hauling them to market. This is bringing the new stock to the front. Continuation of warm weather is apt to bring about an increase in prices of all green vegetables, though within the next week will hold the market at present levels.
