TIMBER CRUISES It is interesting AND TAXATION to note that heretofore Clackamas county has accepted \$48,999 as the valuation of a part of the Weyerhaeuser timber holdings in this county, this estimate having been based upon a cruise alleged to have been made by the big timber company, and furnished the county free of charge.

It is well to bear in mind that this county cruise is one of the things that the disgruntled folk back of the abortive recall were complaining about. It is a strange breed of public spiritedness that objects to the county obtaining a just—and at the same time extremely profitable—assessment of its timber. In fact there is room for suspicion, in view of the findings, that perhaps the objection may not have been entirely disinterested.

CHARLTON SPENDS 3 YEARS IN JAIL

NEW YORK, June 23.—Porter Charlton, who the supreme court of the United States recently decided for the murder of his wife, completed his third year as a prisoner in the Hudson county jail in New Jersey. Mrs. Mary Scott Castle Charlton was murdered in Italy in the early part of June, 1910. The body, having been put into a trunk and thrown into Lake Como, was soon found, but not until Charlton had fled and was on the sea bound for New York. He arrived here on June 22, 1910, and with an hour after his arrest he confessed to the Hoboken police that he was guilty of the crime charged against him.

Charlton was promptly committed to the Hudson county jail. He has been there ever since, while his family and counsel have exhausted every means known to the law to prevent his extradition to Italy. Two weeks ago the last hope was lost when the supreme court decided that the confessed murderer must be surrendered to the Italian authorities.

It is expected that within another month young Charlton will be on his way back to Italy in the custody of the Italian police. Even had he not confessed his crime, it is believed that the young man would have little chances of escaping conviction, as under the Italian system a prisoner is supposed to be guilty until proved innocent. There is no death penalty in Italy, and if Charlton is convicted he will probably get a sentence of twenty years' imprisonment of them in solitary confinement.
