HARVEY STARWEATHER MEMBER OF AMERICAN INQUIRY BOARD, RETURNS

GREAT RURAL PROBLEMS STUDIED Austrian System Found By Commissioners to be One of Best In Use Abread to Ald Farm Development

After a long and interesting trip through the Old World, Harvey Start-weather, well known throughout Clack-numes county, has returned to his bome. Mr. Starkweather was a dele-gate from Oregon upon the American commission appointed from the sev-eral states to investimate rural credits and other servestimate rural credits and other agricultural questions in Europe, and acted in conjunction with a commission appointed by President Taft. Mr. Starkweather will embody his observations in a report shortly and will submit his findings to Governor West

The commission found many mat-ters of interest while abroad, some of their reports on which have already been reported in these columns. In Austria, however, they found one of the most complete systems of co-oper-ation between the state and the agri-culturalists, and nuch of their report will deal with conditions in that will deal with conditions in that country.

years in M By means of a semi-official status Kansas after By means of a semi-official status given to the principal agriculturel as-sociation of the country the Austrian farmers possess an organization which maintains a constant and initmate touch between themselves and the minierry of agriculture. Details of the organization were explained to the members of the American commission during their status and many of during their stay hera, and many of the Americans believe that the United States department of agriculture and the American farmers might consider benefits of this system.

The association which thus connects the farmers directly with the government is the royal and imperial agricultural society of Vienna. All of agricultural society of Vienna. All of the local agricultural societies of the the central society. Through a sys-tem of general assemblies held for members of the various affiliated somembers of the various affinited so-cieties an executive committee 13 elected to carry on the affairs of the cuntral society. The government is given representation upon this com mittee and the society enjoys sub-sidies for certain classes of work from MOU the government.

Although the plan of government support and even of direct leadership in agricultural affairs is as thoroughly accepted in Austria as in other Euro-pean countres, this semi-official society carries on work which no Ameri-can would consider without the province of the department of agricultura. For instance, this society studies the question of cost of production of agri-cultural products, and based upon this data makes direct recommendations of a sami-official character to the gova sami-official character to the gov-ernment regarding the tariff to be fixed upon agricultural products. It protects the rights of the farmers in legal matters, and even works to se-cure him a fair fraight charge on ship-ments of his produce to market.


