The institution is non-sectarian. It has no church affiliations. It plans work for the men who use its rooms and offers them all of the advantages that a Y. M. C. A. can give.

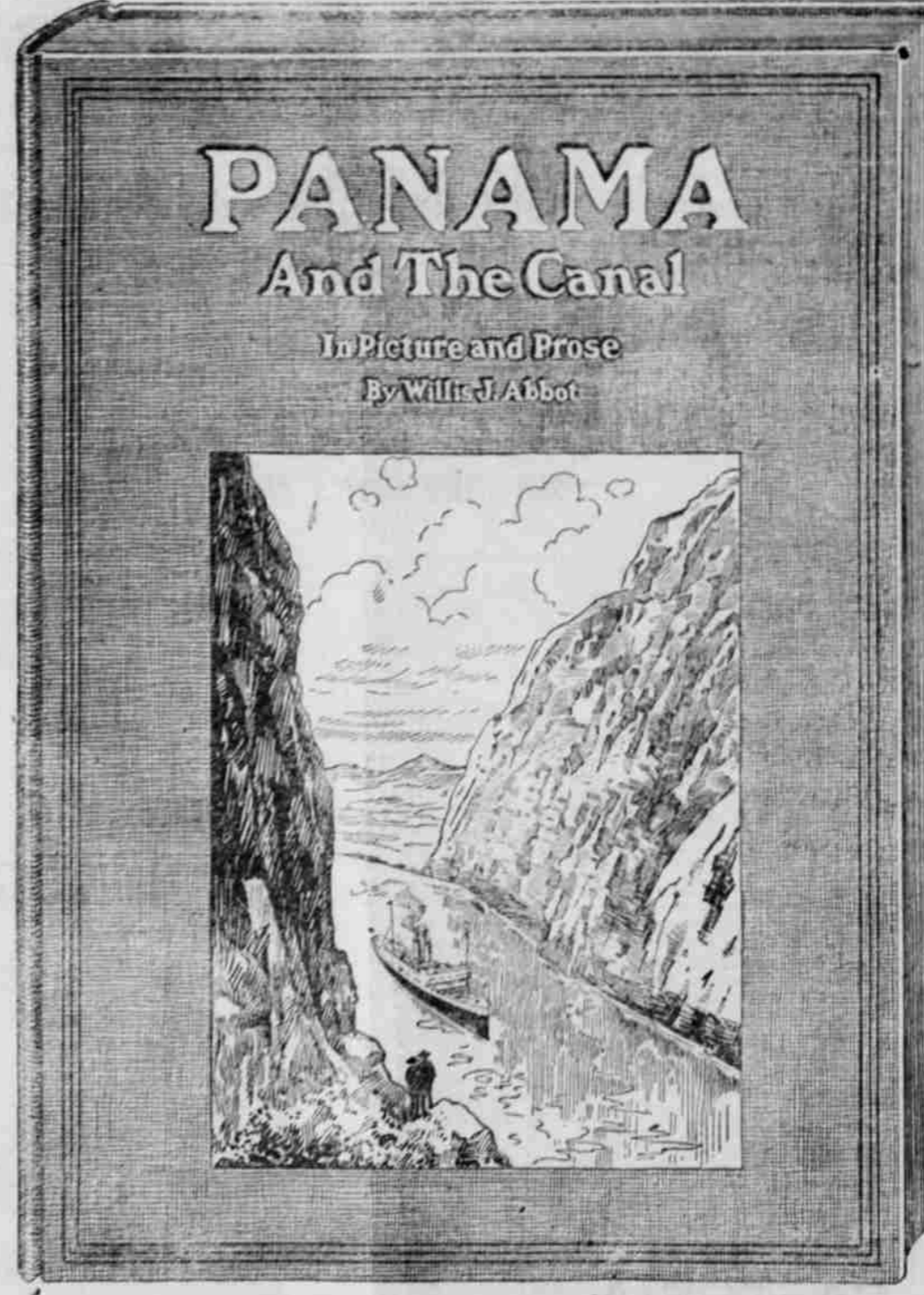
Certainly some such proposition should be tried. There are crowds of young men on the streets of the city every day who are either without work or have no definite plans of recreation for their leisure hours.
