FORMER JAPAN RULER DIES UNNOTICED AT HOME

NEW YORK, Nov. 22.—The death of Prince Keiki Tokugawa, announced in a brief cablegram from Tokyo today, severs a connecting link between the old and new Japan. None of the contemporaries of the pre-Keiki era, or the days of the Shogunate enjoyed such distinction as hedged about Prince Keiki, "the last of the Shoguns."
