NEW SCHOOL URGED AT MASS MEETING

MAJORITY OF MOLALLA PROPERTY OWNERS ENDORSE HIGH SCHOOL PLAN

MOLALLA, Ore., April 1.—(Special)—The committee appointed at the last meeting of the Parent-Teacher association to look into the matter of the consolidation of Molalla and the surrounding districts for the purpose of building a new school house, called a mass meeting at the school building last night.

Although most of those present preferred either a brick or concrete structure, the board was instructed to call an election within twenty days for the purpose of issuing bonds for building a new building, not certifying whether it shall be brick, concrete or frame.

If a frame building is constructed it will not cost more than \$12,000, while a brick or concrete building will cost about \$20,000.

More teachers will be employed and a four year high school course installed. It is considered that Molalla has great need for a new building and everyone is urged by local boosters to do his best to create public sentiment in favor of such a move.
