It is not to cost more than \$20,000. If a frame building is constructed it will not cost more than \$12,000, while a brick or concrete building will cost about \$20,000.

More teachers will be employed and a four years high school course installed. It is considered that Molalla has great need for a new building and everyone is urged by local boosters to do his best to creat public sentiment in favor of such a move. 
