CASE RESTED ON WHETHER CROSS USED EXPRESSION "WHITE SLAVE"

PROMINENT WITNESSES TESTIFY

Action the Result of Campaign Speech Delivered in August, 1913—Time for Bill of Exceptions Given

The jury in the \$25,000 damage suit of M. G. Nease against Harvey E. Cross returned a verdict for the defendant after almost three hours of deliberation Friday afternoon.

In his instruction Judge Eakin confined the case to the single issue of whether or not Harvey Cross called M. G. Nease a "white slave."

The case rested on whether Cross called Nease a "white slave" or not. The defense introduced 12 witnesses to prove that Cross did not make the statement that "Nease is a white slave," as the complaint alleged.

On the other hand, the plaintiff introduced three witnesses, M. B. Laboffrette, Gilbert Hedges and William Howell, who testified that Nease did make the statement that "Nease is a white slave" during his talk.

The suit was the result of a speech campaign speech made last August on Main street in this city, against County Judge Nease. M. G. Nease, who is the timber of the county for the county court under contract for \$42,000. The alleged remark of Cross was aimed at the court through Nease.
