TRAVERS FINDS WOOD O. K.

Has Had No Trouble in Practice For English Turnery.

Jerome D. Travers, the national amateur champion of the United States, who is now in England getting ready for the British amateur championship at Sandwich, beginning on May 18, is no longer worried about himself. This is shown by the fact that in a letter to a friend of his in New York he declares that he is satisfied with his wooden clubs.

When Travers sailed away with Fred Herreshoff he said he had little concern about his change from the Schenectady type of putter to one similar to the Braid-Mills variety, and he seems to have had no trouble with it since his arrival in England. He said at the time of sailing he believed he would be able to get on good terms with the wood, which, as is well known, he preferred not to use in the fast amateur competition. Wood is practically imperatit in Sandwich, so the great little iron master proceeded to try to handle his wooden clubs as he did when he first broke into the limelight.

If any man is dogged in his persistence it is Travers, for it is his temperament never to be beaten until he is actually trounced. In other words, he never gives up until the "last dog is hung." If that is true with an opponent it is likewise true with an inanimate club.

In effect, the amateur champion writes his friend that he is able to get good distance and quite a straight ball with his driver, and this despite the fact that he was held up a few days after his arrival by rain. He practiced every day on his way across, devoting chief attention to his driving.
