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## WITHYCOMBE WINS RETURNS INDICATE

SMITH WILL PROBABLY BE STANDARD BEARER FOR DEMOCRATS

## TWO-THIRDS OF VOTES ARE NOW IN

Moser Loses Republican Race by About 10,500—Supreme Judges in Doubt—Bennett Second Democrat

PORTLAND, Ore., May 16.—That Dr. James Withycombe, of Corvallis, and Dr. C. J. Smith, of Portland, will be the Republican and Democratic candidates, respectively, for governor in the November election was indicated clearly by the figures received from the state at large today.

Only estimates can be made of pluralities, but it is probable that Dr. Withycombe will have plurality of about 6000. With about two-thirds of the vote outside of Multnomah county returned, it is predicted that Dr. Withycombe will come up to Multnomah county with a lead over Gus C. Moser of about 10,500 votes.

In Multnomah county Mr. Moser's plurality over Dr. Withycombe, it is indicated from complete returns from all except 41 precincts, will be about 4500. While in Multnomah county William A. Carter ran ahead of Dr. Withycombe his vote in the country was light, A. M. Crawford, Charles A. Johns, T. T. Geer and Mr. Moser all distancing him.

Dr. C. J. Smith is nominated by the Democrats in all probability by plurality between 1000 and 1500. His closest competitor is A. S. Bennett, of The Dalles, who is second in both Multnomah county and the state outside.

The few scattering returns Friday night that indicated that Mr. Manning would carry Multnomah county were not borne out by the fuller figures.

Umatilla, the former home county of Dr. Smith, and Wasco, the home of Judge Bennett, both gave handsome majorities for their candidates. The other counties throughout the state divided between the two.

Judge Bennett seemingly has carried Baker, Clackamas, Clatsop, Grant, Hood River, Klamath, Linn, Malheur, Marion, Morrow, Dr. Smith leads in the incomplete returns from Benton, Columbia, Coos, Jackson, Lane, Union, Wallowa and Yamhill. Several others, notably Polk, Douglas and Josephine, are close.

While, on the Republican ticket, Dr. Withycombe carried a majority of the counties, each of the leading candidates was favored with one or more. Mr. Moser apparently has carried Clatsop and Tillamook; Mr. Johns his former home county of Baker; Mr. Bennett his home county of Clackamas; Mr. Crawford, Klamath and possibly Morrow and Mr. Geer, Lincoln.

Although George M. Brown lost Multnomah county to Frank S. Grant by approximately 4000, the outside vote more than offsets Mr. Grant's gain, and Mr. Brown seemingly is nominated by a plurality of 4500 to 5000. William P. Lord is third and J. J. Johnson fourth.

With the exception of Justice Bean and Melville, who have substantial leads, the supreme court ticket is in doubt. Three are running neck and neck for the other two places.

## FORMER OPPONENTS ADMIRE WITHYCOMBE

OREGON CITY CANDIDATES TELL STAND THEY WILL TAKE IN FINAL RACE

"I consider Dr. Withycombe a broad minded man and thoroughly familiar with all the interests of the state, and will make Oregon a valuable executive. I will go out on the campaign this fall and make as hard a fight for him as I did for my own nomination." This was the statement of Judge Grant B. Dimick, defeated for the Republican nomination for governor Saturday evening. Mr. Dimick has received a letter from Chas. A. Johns saying that he considered the local candidate "one of the whitest, cleanest candidates for governor," and adding that he "personally would have preferred to support Mr. Dimick if nominated."

George C. Brownell, the second Oregon City candidate at the Republican primary said: "I have always supported the Republican ticket—I personally admire Dr. Withycombe very much. I am for an amendment to the constitution of this state declaring for the abolition of the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors. If he is not against the amendment and will so declare on the stump or otherwise, I will gladly help what I can."

## SCHUBEL WINS OUT IN OFFICIAL COUNT

Chris Schubel is the third Republican nominee for the state legislature. This was determined Wednesday when the official count of W. G. Griswold was given 1946 votes and Schubel 1991. The race between these two men was the closest of any on the county Republican ticket. At times one would lead only to have a new precinct come in and give the other a slight advantage. By the unofficial count, Schubel was given a lead of 18 votes.

## UNOFFICIAL COUNT FAVORS SCHUBEL

OREGON CITY ATTORNEY GETS LEAD OF 18 VOTES IN COMPLETE RETURNS

According to an unofficial count which includes all of the 66 precincts of Clackamas county Chris Schubel is 18 votes ahead of W. Griswold for the third Republican nominee for state representative. This count was completed Monday evening. The other two nominees on the Republican ticket are Guy T. Hunt and Franz Kraxberger.

The count showed Schubel to have 1989 votes and Griswold 1971. It is probable that the official count will change this result a few votes. It was seen early in the count Friday night that the contest between Franz Kraxberger, Chris Schubel and W. Griswold would be close. Slowly Kraxberger drew away from the other two, leaving them with about the same number of votes. At times Schubel would be in the lead of Griswold only to have some new precinct come in and put his opponent at the head. The last precincts to be heard from, George and Sunnyside, practically settled all question as to the third nominee.

The complete unofficial count of the county leaves the tickets of both the Democrats and the Republicans the same as was announced earlier.

## LIVE WIRE ELECTION NEXT TUESDAY

B. T. McBain Tells His Views on the Locks Transfer Problem—Oiled Road is New Project of Organization

The third get-together meeting for the farmers and the Oregon City business men will be held next Tuesday. This matter was discussed at the Live Wires' weekly luncheon Tuesday, although no place has been set. The meeting was referred to a committee, of which O. D. Eby is the chairman, and the announcement of the location will be made within a few days. It is probable that the regular dinner of the Live Wires will be held at 6 o'clock in the evening and that the party will leave direct from the Commercial club building as has been done in the past.

An attempt will be made to secure as large attendance as at the Schubel meeting when about 150 persons were present. Several members spoke favorably Tuesday upon the get-together meetings.

The election of officers will be held Tuesday. B. T. McBain made a report on the locks. After reading the opinion of the United States attorney general and investigating the condition of the locks together with contracts now existing, Mr. McBain is convinced that the report of the attorney general was not based on a clear understanding of the situation. He said that if the United States insisted in all its demands the mills here would be compelled to stop. Franklin T. Griffith, president of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, which is heavily interested in the power rights and the property along the river, is studying the conditions and facts and Mr. McBain expects that an adjustment can be made.

A movement was started to oil the road from Oregon City to the Multnomah county line through Clackamas station, and \$125 was raised in a short time to aid in the cost. A committee will go before the county court and ask that the county help in the work, but in case that the commissioners are not able to assist the Live Wires will

## THEODORE ROOSEVELT ARRIVES IN NEW YORK

WIRELESS BRINGS MESSAGE EX-PRESIDENT IS GREATLY IMPROVED

NEW YORK, May 19.—The steamship Aldan, bearing Theodore Roosevelt from Brazil, came into lower New York harbor this afternoon, after a voyage lasting 12 days.

From the Aldan, as she neared this port, came a wireless message, saying that Colonel Roosevelt's health was greatly improved, and that within a short time he would deliver a lecture on his explorations in Brazil before the National Geographical society, at Washington.

The colonel's friends did not have a chance to greet him. The family had arranged to have a strictly family party meet him at Quarantine with a tug and take him to Oyster Bay, where he was landed at the private pier of his cousin, W. Emlen Roosevelt, only a short distance from his home, Mrs. Theodore Roosevelt, Mr. and Mrs. Theodore Roosevelt, Jr. and W. Emlen Roosevelt made up the family party.

## SURVEY COMPLETION JUNE 1, PROBABLE

ONE CREW IS DISMISSED AND OTHERS WILL FINISH SHARE OF WORK SOON

That the survey of the proposed pipe line from the south fork of the Clackamas river to Oregon City would probably be completed by the first of June was the statement of William Andresen, chairman of the water committee of the Oregon City council Wednesday. One of the three crews which has been working on the survey, has completed its share of the work and has been laid off and it will be but a few days until the other two will complete their part.

With each of the crews were the draughtsmen, so that as the field notes were taken, the profiles and specifications were completed and within a few days of the finishing of the survey itself, advertisements can be made for bids. As soon as bids are secured and the actual cost of the line can be learned, a contract will be drawn between Oregon City and West Linn according to tentative plans already agreed to.

## DETECTIVE TOM KAY WATCHES PLACE

Two Girls Taken into Custody by Portland Police Matron—Governor Says He Will Submit Evidence to Grand Jury

SALEM, Ore., May 20.—Announcing tonight that two girls had been taken in custody at the Friars' club in Milwaukie by Mrs. Lola G. Baldwin, of the municipal department of public safety for women of Portland last night, Governor West declared that the place would be closed tomorrow by the State National Guard and kept closed during the remainder of his administration.

Governor West said further that he had all the evidence that was necessary against the management of the club, and that it would be submitted at once to the grand jury of Clackamas county through District Attorney Hedges. The charges, he said, will be keeping an unlawful house and contributing to the delinquency of minors. "I sent Tom Kay, special state detective, to the place tonight to keep close watch upon it," said the governor. "It will be closed tomorrow morning. Martial law is still in effect there. I removed the troops from the club a short time ago because I did not think it was necessary to keep them there, and to cut down expenses.

"The girls Mrs. Baldwin has in charge were at the club last night drinking intoxicating liquors with men. One of them is 15 years old and the other is 17 years old. I am satisfied drinking has been going on at the club right along. We have the evidence that two men later charged with blowing a safe went to the club and bought drinks. Women were with them. We have evidence that chauffeurs were furnished cards to use in getting patron for the place.

"Some of Portland's prominent young men who foolishly visited the place were used by Wilbur, the manager, to give a semblance of respectability to the resort. In his attempt to establish what he calls the respectability of the club he will undoubtedly find it necessary to give the names of these young men to the grand jury, and it will cause them some unpleasantness when they get into court."

## SWINE INCLUDED IN STOCK SHOW

Merchants Will Decorate Buildings—Preparations Made to Clean Streets in the Business Section

That the crowd present at the combined Rose Festival, Booster Day and Stock Show Saturday will establish a new record for Oregon City is evident from the developments of the last few days. A program, beginning early in the morning and filled with the best of what has before been spread over two celebrations, will, it is thought, draw farmers and townspeople from every part of the north Willamette valley.

Everything so far has progressed with satisfaction to the committee in charge. From present indications the weather will be ideal for such a celebration as is planned. There has been no hitch in the work of the committees, plans are being carried out with no hesitation, new schemes are being developed which will add to the success of the day, and the committee members are able to promise that Saturday will be the leading festa day of Oregon City for the year 1914.

Merchants are preparing to decorate their buildings. A prize has been offered to the best decorated business house and it is evident that there will be much competition among the business men for the honor.

The town will be cleaned up for the occasion. Through the street committee of the council the merchants are requested to sweep the sidewalks in front of their property early Friday evening so that when the program begins Saturday the town will be clean from end to end. Every side street as well as the Main street itself is included in the request of the street committee. All the dirt swept from the sidewalk will be collected by city employees during Friday night.

Mrs. John J. Cooke, president of the Rose society, announced Tuesday that a number of additional prizes had been added to those enumerated on the premium list for the Rose Show. These additional prizes are for exhibits as follows: Second prize for best general collection of tea roses; second prize for hybrid tea roses; second prize for hybrid perpetual roses; third and fourth prizes for best individual roses; a second prize for each entry coming under division "M," these prizes to go to people who have never received a premium.

After some delay it was determined to hold the Stock Show in the Pioneer barn on Main street between Second and Third streets. This is the same place that the Stock Show was held last year.

At the request of many farmers, the committees have included hogs in the list of animals for which prizes are offered.
