ALFALFA SOIL TREATMENT.

How Sour Soils Should Be Incculated and Prepared. By J. G. HUTTON.

Assistant agronomist, State college, South Dakota

In order to grow alfaifa it must be taking nitrogen from the air and com-

may use it. Where alfalfa or sweet clover has never grown it may be necessary to supply the bacteria artificially. The ensiest way to do this is to sentter the soil from a well established nifalfa

In securing the soil for inoculation purposes the top two faches of soil should be removed and the s ll taken

The soil should not be allowed to dry in the sunlight or be exposed to it, as the strong sunlight kills the bacteria. Inoquiate the field just before seeding, sowing the soil broadcast by hand, and follow immediately with a harrow to prevent injury to the bacteria by the sunlight. Some kinds of drills may also be used for sowing the inoculating

For ineculation from 200 pounds to 500 pounds of soil per acre are recommended, though more may be used if available

There is, of course, a chance of get-ting weed pests in the soil used for inaculating purposes, and for this reason soil should not be used from farms where quack grass, dodder or other pests are known to exist. Soil should the new fields.

******* THE TROUBLESOME POTATO.

Old potato growers agree that the market for this stable crop is one of the most unstable, and consequently one of the most difficult to forecast, among the leading crops. Potatoes are a universal food. They can be grown almost anywhere. The crop is relatively of quick growth, but the serious factor is the inability to preserve the surplus of a bountiful year until the time of shortage when the crop is poor. Consequently any considerable increase in price stimulates increased production. and, with favorable conditions, a surplus results and prices often drop so low as to offer no possibillty of profit. There is no serious need of im-

porting potatoes to this country. since a year of favorable prices and a good growing season are immediately followed by a surplus crop. The danger of importing new and serious diseases is sufficient justification for the secretary of agriculture to main tain his careful quarantine against foreign stock. The department has also cautioned potato growers against using secondhand potato sacks which may have contained British or European potatoes, since these sacks are likely to concent the germs of a serious disease .-Country Gentleman. *******



The methods were practiced by the Chinese centuries ago, and the principle was worked out experimentally in England as early as 1776. An Algerian colonist has been planting wheat and onts in the same fields for five years without an application of manure. He makes his furrows thirty-six inches apart and plants the seeds therein at a distance of twenty inches from each other. He harrows constantly. During the five years he has averaged 1,800 pounds of oats per acre and 1,600 of wheat, while a neighbor's yield under ordinary practice has been a scant 800 pounds of oats and 500 of wheat.

To Tell Fertile Eggs.

The simplest, easiest and surest way of testing batching eggs for fertility is to set them in the incubator or under a hen and allow them to incobate for seven days, says a contributor to the Farm and Fireside Then remove the hen or take the tray out of the incubator and allow the eyes to cool for ten minutes. Then hold each egg to the cheek. The warm eggs are the fertile eggs and the cold eggs are those that have no chicks in them. Eggs that are only slightly warm have a very weak germ. The longer the eggs are incubated the easier it is to pick ont eggs that will hatch.

Missourians Propose an 800 Mile Auto

mobile Highway. Missourisus are pinnning to build an automobile tilghway 800 miles long which is to be known as "the Ozark scenic circle." It will begin at St Louis and run southwest to Arendia where it will bend through the Ozark mountains, emerging from the hills at Springfield. From this point the road will run to Sedalia, thence to St. Louis There will be an inner highway, which

will be approximately 400 miles long. Along these roads are thousands of places for every conceivable sort of outing pleasure - canoeing, boating bathing, fishing, bunting and mountain climbing Persons living along the proposed route say it is destined to be come as popular as the Catskills or the mountains of Virginia. The Ozarks offer as grand vistas as the Rocky mountains without their rugged aspect where twenty seeds of grain yielded The blue hills stretch out into hazy wild turkey, quall and other feathered game abound.

Montana Active In Road Work. According to figures issued by the tate highway commission of Montana. the counties of that state spent nearly \$2,000,000 on road and bridge work dur ing 1913. Missoula county led in road work with an expenditure of \$91.527.92. with Dawson county second. Custer county spent more than any other coun on bridges, baving expended \$83, 015.91 for that purpose. It is expected that more improvements will be made on the highways in 1914 than hast year Nightmare Stories.

GOOD ROADS DAY.

State of Washington Sets a Date In Latter Part of May.

City men are to be asked to contribute with pick and shovel to the betterment of highways all over the state of Washington this year when the third good roads day is observed, probably May 23 or 24, the exact date not yet having been named. Governor Ernest Lister has approved the proposal of the Washington State Good Roads association that he issue a proclamation setting aside a good roads day, and the association is already at work upon plans to make it the most effective one yet held.

Under the leadership of the Washington State Good Roads association it is planned to effect a state wide or ganization reaching every hamlet and school district, as well as the larger cities. The various good roads associations, commercial clubs, chambers of commerce and automobile clubs will be called upon to take the initiative. While it is realized that it will be impossible to get all the city folk out into the country, it is hoped that they will observe the occasion of cleanup day in their neighborhood.
