When the deputy returned to the jail Friday, Miller again called him into a corner and told him that Hafer had another knife. Miles, with the aid of Chief of Police Shaw, then began a search of the large cell and the corridor, but the knife was not found until Hafer confessed that he had hid it under a small platform which stands on the steel floor of the cell. The two men secured an axe and found the knife. The second knife was much newer in appearance than the first but was shaped into a saw in the same manner.

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HAFER ATTEMPTS TO BREAK JAIL

DEPUTY MILES FLUSTRATES DESPOTIC ATTEMPTS OF CONVICTED MAN

CRUDE SAWS ARE FOUND IN CELL

Prisoner Awaits Sentence in Circuit Court—Will Be Taken to the State Penitentiary Saturday Morning

A desperate attempt to escape from the county jail was frustrated Friday by Deputy Sheriff Miles when he took away from J. A. Hafer, convicted Thursday by a jury in the circuit court and awaiting sentence, a case knife with the blade nicked so as to form a saw. In an obscure corner of the jail Deputy Miles found where Hafer had attempted to make a hole in the roof. The knife taken from Hafer Friday was the second in 24 hours.

Thursday night Miles went into the jail with food for the prisoners, when Frank Miller, held for stealing a pig, called the deputy into a far corner and told him that Hafer had a knife. Miles then went to Hafer who surrendered it without resistance. This knife was old and the nicks were uneven and crudely made.

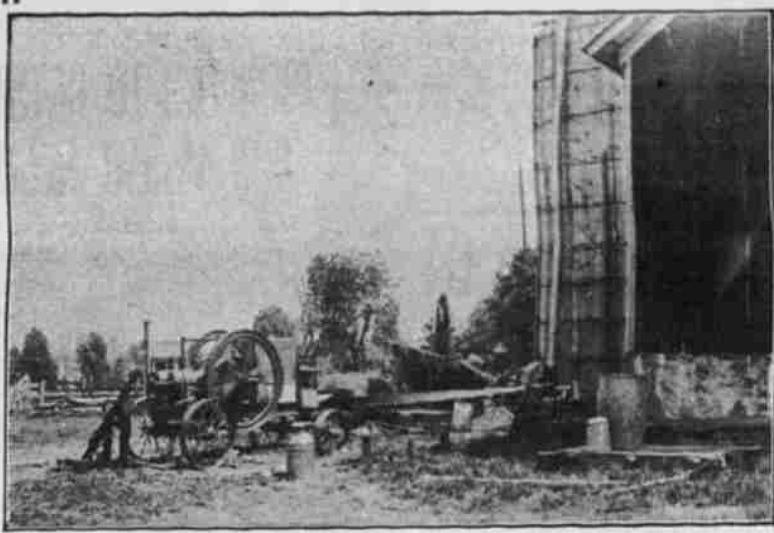

WEEKLY INDUSTRIAL REVIEW

Oregon Development News in Line of Industries, Payrolls and Products of Labor and Enterprise.

During the past week the Oregon Public Utilities commission has fixed standards of quality in water, gas, light, heat and telephone service. Effect of order not yet known.

July 1st, the new workmen's compensation act goes into effect and this is the late date on which manufacturers and employers can give notice of not coming under the provisions of the act.

Big strikes reported at High Grade mine, near New Pine creek.

Work will start soon on the Carnegie library at Marshfield.

In asking for paving bids, Albany bars bids on concrete paving.

Klamath Falls is now after the Bandon woolen mills with a free site.

The Gleason yards at Cottage Grove will burn a half-million brick.

Lafayette will install a \$15,000 water plant.

St. Johns is providing a street for an outlet for the Western Cooperative Co., that employs 200 men.

All the principal streets of Heppner are to be tiled.

Andrew Kennedy is putting in machinery and a plant to manufacture coal bricks on Coos Bay.

The skyrunner limit has been raised at Portland from 160 feet to 200 feet.

The McKenzie river hatchery is to be increased in capacity to 2,000,000 fish annually.

Warrenton, Clatsop and West Side towns are to have telephones.

Sheepmen in Umatilla county are selling off their flocks unable to compete with free wool.

Brick manufacture is being established at Sisters.

Mosier wants a fruit cannery.

New school houses are going to be built in Lane county, cost \$60,000.

Willamette Pacific tracks are to reach tidewater by October. In all 1500 men are employed.

Douglas county will finish planking the road over Camas mountain.

Randon will erect a municipal dock. Ashland has voted \$175,000 bonds to develop mineral springs and baths on a large scale.

Governor West announces that 2000 acres of the Tunalo project is ready for settlers at forty dollars per acre.

H. C. Sampson of the North Pacific Fruit Distributors' association, says the Panama canal will bring shipments of German beer and the vessels will take fruit tonnage back with them.

Also Oregon grain crops are estimated at 65,024,000 bushels by the department of agriculture.

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CLACKAMAS STREAMS BEST

So Says John Gill in the Oregon Sportsman, in Describing Waters of Oregon Counties.

In the Oregon Sportsman, published under the supervision of the state game and fish department, a series of articles on the rivers and streams of Oregon have been published. In the June issue a lengthy article, by John Gill, describes the streams of Clackamas county from the standpoint of the fisherman. In part the article follows:
