DRUGGISTS OF OREGON CITY ARE QUIZZED IN DAWSON

Inquest at Portland May Develops Facta Which Will Aid in Solving Mystery of Death of Laborer

A complete canvass of the five drug stores in Oregon City failed to disclose the place where the strichnins, found in the stomach of George S. Dawson. of Portland, who died at his home last Wednesday as a result of taking the poison, was bought, although it was thought for a time by the Portland po-lice that the powder was purchased in BELFAST, Ireland, July 20,-Bir Ed

"We are all determined to have the mysterious circumstances cleared up before we drop the case," said Deputy District Attorney Ryan tday. "We do not want to throw any undue suspicupon Mrs. Dawson, but we feel that from what evidence we have secured already, her arrest was neces-sary, and that she should be detained without bail until we learn where the Colonel Martin Declares Oregon City and how it was taken. If the inquest reveals this we will then know whether we can release Mrs. Dawson or keep her in jail.

The prisoner still maintains her attitude of innocense. She continually declares she holds no ill feeling against those responsible for her incarceration and protests her plight is merely a test sent by the Lord to try her faith.

OUTWARD BOUND

HOST SPECTACULAR BLAZE IN YEARS

Those on Board Craft Are Calm as

Smoke Envelopes Ship-Steam er Reaches Dock With Crawd NEW YORK, N. Y., July 18 .- More

than 100,000 persons gathered on the Battery and the Brooklyn and Manhat-tan bridges late this afternoon and east river in 1904, with its record of 1000 deaths.

The passenger steamship Massachusetts with 760 passengers and a craw of more than 200, an oil burning ship, had cleared from her pier in the north river and swung into New York bay shortly after 5 o'clock when came a sudden burst of flame through the upper works amidships where the aft funnel rose from oil tank room in the hold.

Too far from its own pler to return with safety, Captain P. W. Colbeth, who was on the bridge when the fire was discovered, decided to land his ship at the Battery. Swinging around he found that all the available docking space was occupied with Saturday afternoon excursion steamers. Still afraid to risk turning his vessel around and back into the north river, Captain Colbeth rang for slow speed ahead and started to circle the Battery and run for a pier in the east river two miles

almost completely enveloped in a cloud of dense black oil smoke. It was impossible to rush her at any speed for fear the draft so set up would drive the flame all over the ship. Every available man was at work rigging up fire hose and preparing to man the lifeboats while squads told off from the crew herded the passengers at the stern and in the bow far from the blaze amidships as possible.

With her whistle blowing repeated distress, the Massachusetts slowly swung across the Battery front, past Governor's island and into East river. Half a dozen fireboats by this time had stood by, but Captain Colbeth signalled that he thought it would be saf-er to keep on up the river, as he hoped to keep the flames partly under con-trol until some way could be found to get the passengers ashore.

The fireboats, blowing their sirens in weird chorus to clear the pathway of shipping, convoyed the Massachu-setts, and all the small croft came alongside, in case more assistant was needed.
