MILWAUKIE, Ore., Aug. 19.—The Milwaukie city council at a special meeting last night passed an ordinance granting L. H. Campbell, a civil engineer of Milwaukie, a 25-year franchise for a street railway in Milwaukie.

Stephen Carver, whose application for the Portland & Oregon City railroad has been given its first reading, will have to make a similar stipulation before his franchise is granted.

The franchise, which was amended by the public utility committee of the council, contains a "common user" clause covering the entire line.
