WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 2 .- Orecon farmers produced 1,716,000 tons of tame or cultivated hay during 1914. It is there, in the opinion of military according to the preliminary estimates made today by the United States department of agriculture. The yield last year was 1,732,000 tons. The product is selling for an average of \$9 per ton, compared with \$8.40 per ton in 1913. ### CONCENTRATING FORCES

Ostend is Held and Great Army Moves Toward Ypres-Allies Send Fresh Troops on Belgian Soil

PARIS, Nov. 4.-What the Helgian ficial communication designated as "precipitate retreat" of the Germans before the advance of the allies on the Yeer river in Belgium was pleas ing news to Parisiana today though previous developments had givon the hope that this soon would b the case.

The significance of the move is chief topic of discussion.

There is also much speculation as to the destination of the Germans, as the Belgian communication merely that they were retrating toward the east. The fact that the allies retained in his section the positions they occupled the day before would seem to in-dicate that the Germans had not been
