Christmas began to bring the frost out of the ground and rain began to fall Saturday morning and continued until Tuesday, which was a beautiful day overhead, but Wednesday we had rain by spells all day, frost all out of the ground apparently and mud growing deeper, and old Oregonians begin to feel better, and colds in many cases are getting to be a thing of the past.

The fields look green, like spring and it is not believed the frost has injured fruit or growing grain in this locality.

Again we are called upon to record a sudden death in our neighborhood. Miss Minnie Keller had been ailing for a couple of weeks and complaining of a sore throat, caused it was supposed, by having swallowed a piece of a chicken bone, but was not confined to her bed or room. On Sunday her brother and his wife, with whom she had a home on the old Prindle place, went to Oregon City to attend church, taking the three oldest children, and leaving a girl of perhaps 12, the old grandmother, who is totally blind, with the younger children and Miss Minnie. She was helping the young girl finish the dishes when she began to fall, and her young niece caught her and the old mother received her in her arms, telling the girl to phone for somebody. She called one or two before getting an answer from central who sent across the street to the chapel where services were being held, and nearly the entire congregation went over, about a mile or more, but found her dead in her poor old mother's arms. In the meantime central got word to the brother and family at the Evangelical church in Oregon City, and they hastened home. The funeral was held at the chapel at 1 o'clock on Tuesday. The minister from the Evangelical church conducted the services in German and Mrs. Neal, of the Church of God, added a short exhortation in English. The deceased would have been 50 years old in February, and has been a remarkably strong, healthy woman. The poor, blind mother is nearly 80. The family has the sympathy of neighbors and friends.

Christmas passed off quietly with family trees, big dinners and loving tokens of remembrance and the usual tree and exercises at the German Baptist church. We had no snow through all our two weeks of cold weather, and everyone had plenty of wood, blankets, potatoes, etc., therefore we feel we have abundant cause to be thankful. Many families had friends out from town. Schatz's had 21 at their table and Gage's 14, while Ellegren's and Tiedeman's numbered as many, and Thomas' had all their sons and families and there were smaller gatherings wherever heard from.

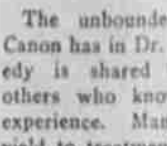

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 26.—Del Howard will not be manager of the San Francisco Pacific Coast league club during the 1915 season.

Announcement to this effect was made here today by Henry Berry, the new owner of the Seals, who returned unexpectedly last night from Los Angeles.

"Howard has been advised that I will want to make a complete shift in the club this year, and that I think it will be advisable to select a new manager," Berry said. "I consider Howard a competent man, but I believe the San Francisco fans want a change. I have told Howard that I will do everything in my power to assist in placing him, but I don't believe Del knows just what he is going to do."

Berry also said that Frank Dillon, manager of the Los Angeles club, would not be brought here to take charge of the Seals.

"I wouldn't be surprised to see Dillon retained as manager of the Angels," he said. "He has the nucleus of a good team, and he has always been a contender for the pennant."

"I am considering the names of several men and I hope to make a definite announcement as to the new manager within a few days. I believe I will be able to get a man who will meet with hearty approval. What I want is a fighter and a man who can keep the team up in the race."

Howard came to San Francisco from the St. Paul American association club. Before that he had been a stockholder in the Louisville club of the same organization, to which he went from the Chicago Nationals.

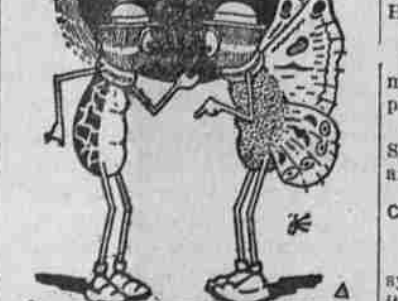

BARBOUR MUCH SOUGHT

PORTLAND, VENICE AND OAKLAND AFTER DENVER PLAYER

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 30.—According to advices from Los Angeles, where J. C. McGill, the Denver Western league manager is spending the winter, Portland is not the only club which is after the services of Third Baseman Louis Barbour.

According to the latest line of dope, both Oakland and Venice are to be given a chance to bid on the player. McGill states that Portland has offered him Buddy Ryan, Hi West, Elmer Salvenon, Frank Eastley, Tiny Leonard, U. S. Smith and one or two others, while Hogan has jumped into the competition by offering Catcher McClain or Speck Harkness for Barbour.

The Oakland club hasn't made any direct offer but Christian has two or three men who might be utilized in a swap. Barbour, who is said to have had only a fair year at Denver, consequently is not in much demand.

Since McCredie secured both Murphy and Reed from the Philadelphia Nationals, he is not particular whether he secures Barbour or not, he says. He has a surplus of infielders, and while he would be willing to give one of the pitchers for Barbour, who has had enough experience to make good with a Coast league club, he is not worrying much over what McGill does in the matter. If either Oakland or Venice grabs the player in question, it will be all right with him.

FRESH EGGS CHEAPER IN OREGON MARKETS

While some of the trade is still nominally quoting as high as 40c a dozen for fresh ranch eggs, the general mar-

ket Wednesday was weak at 38c for candled offerings.

One Portland creamery refused a shipment of fresh supplies from the country during the last 24 hours because, it is stated, its holdings were already heavier than it could profitably take care of.

Receipts of fresh eggs throughout this part of the state demand shows no improvement, while the pressing of so much cold storage stock on the market is still a demoralizing factor, because holders are exceedingly anxious to clean up and prices are being shaded right and left whenever there is a possible chance to do business.

Conditions in the egg trade all along the coast are far from showing a favorable sign, and in practically all markets lower prices have resulted. The outlook for the immediate future is therefore for a lower trend of values all along the coast.

ONIONS OFFERED IN PORTLAND FOR \$1.25

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 29.—Onions are today being offered to the trade by members of the Confederated Onion Growers' association for the first time in several weeks. The price remains at \$1.25 a cental f. o. b. country shipping points.

"We expect to get out a carload or so today," says W. I. Swank, selling agent for the organization, "and believe that the outward movement will now be steady."

"At one time there was every likelihood that all of our onions would be purchased by the warring European nations, but the inability to get shipments to the front stopped the trade right where it started."

"At this time the onion market is quiet but is steady. I am somewhat disappointed that even the local markets failed to clean up over the cold weather when country shipments were not being made. However, we are again getting business at the price mentioned and expect all offerings to easily clean up this season."

Onions are being freely offered at \$1.50 a cental.

TRADE IN CATTLE IS ACTIVE IN PORTLAND

Receipts for the week at the Portland Union Stock Yards Co. have been: Cattle 638, calves 9, hogs 7123, sheep 2469.

The cattle market opened up for the week very actively. Good quality of offerings was in evidence, choice steers going as high as \$7.75, cows touched the \$6.50 level. Since Monday the run has been below normal with good demand.

A very keen hog market started Monday with a run of nearly 6000 tops, bringing \$7.50. This market has maintained its supremacy in price over all other American markets for some time.

With the exception of Monday's run the receipts continue light. The market on all classes of sheep is good and killers take all offerings readily. Shipping to the market could be materially increased without any decline in price.
