

Wife Saves Husband From Facing A Serious Charge

Frank McCaffery, of West Linn, who was arrested Sunday night by Sheriff Wilson and Deputy Frost after he had driven his wife and children from their home, is a free man today following the refusal of his wife to appear against him.

McCaffery was arrested in Sunday and placed in the county jail overnight. Monday morning he was taken into the justice court where he was to be prosecuted on a charge of being drunk and disorderly. Mrs. McCaffery refused to testify against him and he was turned over to the West Linn authorities who will not push the charge.

McCaffery was arrested by Chief of Police Shaw two weeks ago on a charge of violating the city liquor ordinance. He has been in trouble with the authorities several times during the winter.

JAIL SENTENCES HANG OVER FRIARS

WILLIE AND JULIUS WILBUR ARE PAROLED DURING THEIR GOOD BEHAVIOR

Convicted Resort-Keepers Announce They Will Appeal to Supreme Court—Heavy Fines Are Imposed on Brothers.

Julius Wilbur and Willie Wilbur, convicted on a charge of selling liquor on Sunday at the Friars' club in Milwaukee, were sentenced to six months in the county jail Thursday morning and then paroled during good behavior. The former, who is secretary of the club, was fined \$250 and the latter, the steward, \$200.

George C. Brownell, their attorney, announced that the cases would be appealed to the supreme court because of insufficiency of evidence. Joe Harris and Frank Moore, waiters at the club, who pleaded guilty, paid fines of \$75 each.

The conviction of the four this week in the circuit court, is the third conviction secured by District Attorney Hedges against Milwaukee resort keepers within the last year. Early in the summer of 1914 the two Wilburs and two waiters associated in the club with them, were convicted on a charge of selling liquor to a minor.

In the opinion of the county officials the conviction did not result in a reform of the club and early on the morning of September 13, Sheriff Mass raided the place and took 35 men and women whose names were retained to be used in future prosecutions of the club proprietors. The case against the four this week was based on this raid.

In November Fritz Boyesen, proprietor of the Hotel Belle in Milwaukee, was convicted on a charge of selling liquor to a minor.

BELGIUM WILL REPAY AMERICA

BRUSSELS, Jan. 7, via London, Jan. 7.—"If the United States had not come to our aid, it would have meant starvation for most of us," said Alfred Nerinx, provisional burgomaster of Louvain, today. "We are willing to work, but we cannot when the doors are closed to exports. We cannot buy food, even if we have the money, when the doors are closed to imports. It is no fault of ours if we starve. Feed us now and we shall pay you back in industry when the war is over.

BRITAIN REMEDIES U.S. COMPLAINTS

TRADE WITH ITALY AND HOLLAND TO RESUME THROUGH UNDERSTANDING.

STILL FURTHER RELIEF IS EXPECTED

Russian Invasion of Hungary Greatest Move in European War—Although Fight Intense in Flanders, There is No Change.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—Arrangements between Great Britain Italy and The Netherlands have been completed whereby commerce to the latter two countries from the United States is expected to undergo a minimum of molestation.

The steps taken by Great Britain and announced in statements from both the British embassy and State Department remedy some of the complaints made by the United States in its recent note to Great Britain and the plans encouraged administration officials in the hope that commerce with the Scandinavian countries and other neutral nations would be improved.

The statement indicated that so far as Italy and Holland are concerned the British government now believes the danger of getting contraband articles through those countries to Germany and Austria has practically been removed. Should effective measures be agreed on between the allies and other neutrals of Europe, American commerce, it is thought by British officials, will not be subject to the delays and interference complained of in the American note.

CARRANZA CANCELS ALL CONCESSIONS

GALVESTON, Tex., Jan. 8.—Mexican Consul Burns announced here today that General Carranza had annulled all land, water and forest concessions granted since December, 1876, and had promised to return this national wealth to Mexican townships. Great American and other foreign interests are affected by the order.

FILTH DECLARED TO BE CAUSE OF DEATH

TACOMA, Wash., Jan. 8.—Two children are dead and their mother, Mrs. Edward Minette, is in a critical condition at a local hospital as a result, attending physicians declare, of poisoning, contracted because of poverty and insanitary conditions, in their home at Melmont.

Mrs. Minette and the children were brought here yesterday. Sarah, 4 years old, died a few hours after arrival, and Edward, an infant son, died at the hospital today. Mrs. Minette may recover.

CONTESTS FOR ROAD SUPERVISORS WARM

PAUL ROETHE IS VIGOROUSLY OPOSED BY E. D. OLDS, WHO PRESENTS PETITION.

Although road supervisors will probably not be appointed until the middle of the month contests in several districts have become warm and a great number of applications have been made to the county court.

The race between E. D. Olds and Paul Roethe for the Jennings Lodge district reached fever heat when the former this week presented to the court a petition signed by a number of taxpayers in the district asking that he be named supervisor.

The taxpayers' meeting, held the latter part of November recommended Paul Roethe, present supervisor for the place although Olds' name was mentioned. Olds claims that his followers, who live at Oak Grove, were lead from the meeting by a false announcement made five minutes before the vote was taken that the last Oak Grove car would leave within a short time.

The contest between J. W. Root and John Bennett at Chackamas Heights has also become one of the features of the race for supervisor. C. E. Hatton is opposed in the Wilwaukie and Ardswald district.

M'ADOO SEES SIGNS OF PROSPERITY HERE

CHICAGO, Jan. 8.—"Just let the pessimists lay low, and business will boom." This was the declaration here today of Secretary of the Treasury William G. McAdoo, who is in Chicago on his way to Washington after a visit to California and other western states. "Throughout the west I saw many evidences of prosperity," he continued. "The people out there are working together in a common cause. They are bringing prosperity to their doors instead of awaiting its coming."

Secretary McAdoo attended the opening of the Panama-California exposition in San Diego as the official representation of President Wilson.
