Mrs. Mary Charman, a resident of Oregon City since 1857 and for many years one of the most prominent women in this part of the Willamette valley, died at her home, 511 Main street, at 7 o'clock Sunday night, after an illness which has extended over a period of two years.

During her life in Oregon City, Mrs. Charman has taken an active interest in the work of the Eastern Star, the Woman's club and the Woman's Relief Corps. She was a member of the Congregational church and for several years was a trustee. She was financial secretary of the Woman's club.

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She is survived by one son, T. L. Charman, and her sister, Mrs. Sophia Charman, both living here. Besides these she leaves Mrs. Lena Charman, Miss June Charman, Elbert Charman, and the families of J. H. Walker, J. P. Lovett, F. R. Charman, and Mrs. Matilda Charman as near relatives.

The funeral will be held at 2:30 o'clock from the Congregational church and interment will be in the Masonic cemetery. Rev. George N. Edwards will officiate. The members of the Woman's club will attend the funeral in a body.

Bill By Representative Guy Hunt Is Aimed At Prescriptions In Latin

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 19.—(Special.)—Physicians' prescriptions and recipes of certain kinds will have to be written in plain English if a bill which Representative Hunt has introduced becomes a law. Latin or any other language may be used but there must be three copies in English. One copy is for the physician, one for the patient and one for the druggist. "The object of the bill," said Mr. Hunt, "is to let people know what they are getting. It will put an end to fake prescriptions, and will give persons not acquainted with Latin a chance to determine whether they are taking poison alcohol or such things." Senator Dimick is the only member of the general assembly who has refused to accept the provisions of a resolution providing that the state furnish each member five newspapers daily during the session. "I'll pay for my own newspaper," said the Clackamas county senator. "I was not sent here for the state to buy newspapers for me." Representative Hunt, chairman of the committee on horticulture, has a big job on his hands in the shape of a bill introduced by Representative Vawter, of Douglas and Jackson counties. It revolutionizes the whole system of supervision by providing for the appointment of a state horticultural commissioner. It also relates to examination of agricultural products. Mr. Hunt says frankly he does not thoroughly understand the measure, but will before next Friday when a public hearing has been called. It is a voluminous document.
